Food Stores And Union Reach New Wage Agreement

An agreement covering wages and working conditions for employees of the retail grocery, produce and delicatessen stores in the harbor district, was reached this week between the Food Industries, employers and the Retail Clerks International Protective Association, Local 905, A. F. of L., representing the clerks. The announcement was made by Haskell Tidwell, secretary of the clerks union.

The new agreement provides a \$3.00 per week increase over the previous contract, and is effective June 11, 1946, extending to December 31, 1946, Tidwell states.

Grocery, produce and delicatessen stores in Torrance, Comita, Gardena, San Pedro, Wilmington and Santa Catalina Island are included in the agreement, Tidwell announces.

Torrance Firemen Fail In Effort To Revive Girl

Efforts of Torrance fire department's inhalator squad, called as a last-minute effort, failed to revive 10-year-old Dorene McCullough, who was drowned Sunday afternoon in a pond near Palos Verdes dr. and Western ave. The girl, who lived in the Harbor Hills housing project, fell in the pond while playing, witnesses said. She was pulled out by nearby residents who heard her cry for help.

A California highway patrolman attracted to the scene called the Torrance firemen's aid in addition to calling the sheriff's sub-station at 108th st. and Vermont avenue. Firemen worked for more than 20 minutes to revive the child, before a Lomita doctor pronounced her dead.

Dorene was the daughter of Mrs. Shirley McCullough, 730 Harbor Hills, and Ralph McCullough of Estes Park, Colo. A brother, Richard, also survives.

The Torrance fire department was not called until almost an hour after the mishap, Chief J. E. McMaster said.
