Portraits Made Now Available To Gold Star Mothers

Gold star parents of Torrance can honor the memory of sons lost in the war by having lifelike memorial portraits created from favorite photographs of those who gave their lives for their country.

This suggestion was made by Fine Art Associates, a Los Angeles artists' group located at 141 S. Robertson Blvd., which will serve as a clearing house where parents may find a competent artist for the memorial they desire.

E.A.A.'s roster includes outstanding California portrait painters widely known for their pictures of Hollywood stars and other celebrities. The portraits would be fitting memorials not only for the home but for presentation to a veteran's organization or the school attended by the son.

More Telephone Circuits Are Made Available

Forty-eight more telephone circuits, without the addition of any more wire or cable, will be available over the Los Angeles-San Diego telephone cable route when the installation of additional equipment in both terminal offices and eight intermediate offices along the way is completed, it was announced by F. Y. Snyder, district manager of the Southern California Telephone Company.

Installation work, estimated to cost \$160,000, has just started and will be completed about the middle of August to provide more service between the two cities and allow for more rapid long distance calls from intermediate points, the manager said.

Snyder explained that telephone engineers use a pair of wires within a cable in each direction to complete a two-way conversation for long distance calls. By superimposing a staggered group of 12 "carrier frequencies" it is possible to carry on 12 different conversations at the same time over the same wires without interference.

This project calls for the addition of terminal equipment and amplifiers along the route to enable the telephone company to send more calls over the same wires—without adding any more cable between the terminal stations.

Three additional circuits are also being added over open wires—by a similar technique—between Newhall and Las Vegas, Nevada, Snyder said.

DODGE RESERVOIR TROUT

Trout fishing in Dodge Reservoir near Ravendale, Butte County, is declared very good. Fish were planted two years ago and now weigh about one pound each. The reservoir is about two miles long and many limits are taken from the shore with bait or flies.

OPA ALLOWS PRICE INCREASE OF FOUR CENTS ON PRESERVES

Retail prices of guava, quince and tomato preserves—so far not advanced from prices in force in 1942—will go up three to four cents per one-pound jar as the result of an action taken today by the OPA. The new prices are effective June 26.

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L.A. County Sanitarian Assures Sanitation In Summer Camps Here

If the children are planning to go to a summer camp in Los Angeles county this year, parents can rest assured that the sanitation of these camps is under the constant surveillance of the mountain and rural sanitarian representing the Los Angeles County health department. There are some fifty of these camps in all, with an annual population of around 30,000 children whose aim is to have a swell time—and who wouldn't!

With healthy young appetites, enormous quantities of food are consumed. The methods of storing, preparing and serving of this food are supervised by the sanitarian in his regular visits to these camps.

Most camps have swimming pools of one sort or another, and these pools are used intensively. All swimming pools must be kept clean and safe. Frequent inspections are made. Specialized and sensitive instruments are employed in conjunction with regular laboratory tests, to assure the cleanliness

and safety of these pools. Sleeping quarters vary in type from the rugged pioneer style to the more elaborate dormitories. In either case, an adequate supply of fresh air and proper spacing, as well as general sanitation, is required.

All camps operate under annual permit, and high standards of sanitation are a must. Men from the bureau of sanitation are on call for those groups that may need assistance in solving problems of water supply, sewage disposal, swimming pool sanitation, food sanitation, or sanitation in general.

So when Mary or Johnnie starts out for a sojourn in one of these camps, dad and mom can be sure that their welfare is not only watched over by capable camp directors, but by representatives of the Los Angeles County health department as well.
