Survey Of Child Health Service Is Planned

Plans have been completed for the survey in Los Angeles County of available child health services. Dr. Anna E. Rude, director of the Bureau of Maternal and Child Hygiene for the Los Angeles County Health Department, announced.

Organized on a national scope by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the study will determine what hospital facilities, community health services, and professional personnel are available.

"Doctors and lay groups are aware that if children are to receive adequate medical care in the post-war period, systematic planning must be done," Dr. Rude pointed out.

"The aim of the study," she said, "is to make available to all mothers and children in the United States as well as in Los Angeles County, all essential preventive, diagnostic and curative medical services of high quality."

Local groups will have access to the final report which will contain not only a digest of their own data but also a general picture throughout the country for comparison.

Dr. Clement Malony of Los Angeles is executive director for the work in this area.

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
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
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Management's-eye-view of the Santa Fe
