**County Classes For Expectant Mothers Resume**

Following a summer vacation the class for expectant mothers will be resumed at the Torrance Health Center, 2300 Carson st., Mrs. Gladys T. Pearce, supervising public health nurse, has announced, and will meet every Thursday afternoon at 1:30 starting Sept. 5.

Miss Margaret Ploger, public health nurse in the Torrance health district, will be the instructor in the new class. Subjects to be discussed in the ten weeks' course include the purpose of prenatal care and physical examination, anatomy, physiology and hygiene of pregnancy, and nutrition. The latter half of the course will be on mothers' and babies' clothes and supplies, bath demonstration, formula making and preparation for delivery.

Motion picture films dealing with several of these subjects will be shown by the Los Angeles County Health Department. All prospective mothers of Torrance and those who have the care of newborn babies are invited to the classes, there being no charge for this health service.

**Tuberculosis X-Ray Unit To Visit National**

A visit will be made by the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health Association's mobile X-ray unit to Torrance on Sept. 9 through 13 when the unit stops at the plant of the National Supply Company to provide free chest X-rays for its employees.

Also under consideration at this time is the possibility of X-raying the employees at the Columbia Steel Corporation. This has not been definitely set.

Since Jan. 1 of this year, more than 16,000 men and women in 28 industrial plants and four communities have availed themselves of the opportunity for free chest X-rays on the unit.

This free X-ray service is purely voluntary. X-rays are given by a specially trained technician and assistant. The 4x5 films, which make it possible to detect any evidences of shadows, are read by doctors trained in the reading of X-ray film. A written report on the findings is mailed to each person taking an X-ray.

The mobile unit of the Tuberculosis Association is one of many activities provided for through the annual sale of Christmas Seals. In addition to the mobile unit, the Association does tuberculin testing in the schools and carries on a year-round health education program through radio, speakers, pamphlets and films on tuberculosis, heart disease and rheumatic fever.

**Newsprint Up \$7 A Ton In New OPA Rule**

Manufacturers' ceiling prices for newsprint sold in the United States have been increased \$7 per ton, the OPA announced recently.

The increase may be applied on all deliveries of newsprint since Aug. 8, 1946, when OPA allowed sales on an adjustable pricing basis, pending final determination whether a price increase would be granted.

This increase has been granted to help assure an adequate supply of newsprint for United States publishers by attempting to prevent a diversion to other markets of foreign newsprint normally shipped to the United States, as well as check any tendency on the part of domestic producers to divert newsprint production to other more profitable lines of paper.

OPA said it had noted that increases had been incurred in costs for raw materials, labor and freight since newsprint ceilings were placed on Dec. 11, 1945. The present action is a discretionary adjustment to offset those cost increases, remove impediments to production, and assure stable sources of supply.

The increase applies to all newsprint sold for use in the United States, whether made in this country or imported. Approximately 80 percent of total newsprint used in the United States at present comes from Canada. Newsprint consumption approximates 3,250,000 tons a year.

**Col. Holderman On VFW Camp Guard Of Honor**

Colonel Nelson M. Holderman, commandant of the Veterans Home at Napa, Calif., has been selected by Charles P. Ash, commander of the Department of California, Veterans of Foreign Wars, to represent California as a member of the 47th National Encampment Guard of Honor in Boston, Sept. 1 to 8, where the VFW holds its National meeting.

One Congressional Medal of Honor hero from each VFW State Department in the nation will comprise the Guard of Honor serving as an honorary escort to Dwight D. Eisenhower, chief of staff, U. S. Army, and supreme commander of the Allied Expeditionary Force during World War II when he speaks on Sept. 3, 1946.

Colonel Holderman, long-time member of the VFW, was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Nation's highest trophy, while serving with the Lost Battalion in the first World War. He has served as commandant of the Veterans Home since 1926 and is well known in all veteran circles.

**Leading Stunt Pilot To Appear In Big Air Show**

Successor to the famed Tex Rankin, as the nation's most spectacular aero-gymnastics pilot, intrepid Sammy Mason of Merced, Calif., yesterday wired his entry for the huge first annual Southern California Air Show to be held Sept. 14 and 15 at the Long Beach Municipal Airport.

The event, in which Army, Navy and Marine Corps air might will be displayed, is supported by city and civic leaders and is being held in recognition of the importance Long Beach has attained in the aviation world.

A protégé of former World Champion Tex Rankin, who retired from air show stunt flying two years ago, Mason pilots a Stearman plane in hair-raising gymnastics that even elicit gasps from veteran war pilots. During the war Mason was instructor of Uncle Sam's Army fighter pilots. Now only 23 years of age, the "Merced Meteor" has been a pilot since he was 15 and has devoted his entire career to stunt flying.

Mason and Tony LeVier, chief Lockheed engineering test pilot, who performs death-defying stunts in a P-38 at incredible speed, will head the civilian flyers in the forthcoming air extravaganza, which will include speed record flights by jet planes, formation and aerobatic flying by Uncle Sam's war heroes of the air, and a ground display of Army and Navy equipment and latest civilian planes.

2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin	1 package white cream cheese
3 tablespoons cold water	4 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup boiling water	1/2 cup diced peeled peaches*
1/2 teaspoon salt	
1/2 cup Pet Milk	

Soften gelatin in cold water. Stir in boiling water and salt. Let stand. Stir milk gradually into cheese. Mix in gelatin mixture and lemon juice. Chill until syrupy; then beat with rotary beater until fluffy. Fold in peaches.\* Rinse with cold water a 1 1/2-pint mold. Fill with mixture. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce if desired. Serves 4.

Note: To garnish salad as illustrated, arrange additional sliced peaches in mold before you fill it with the mixture.  
\*Oranges, pears or apricots can also be used.
