Plan To Start Building New \$100,000 Baptist Church

Plans are ready for construction of this fall of the new \$100,000 Torrance Baptist church edifice which may occupy the site on which the present church now stands, the pastor, Rev. C. M. Northrup, said Tuesday. The Rev. Mr. Northrup explained that another site may be selected but, for the present, the Carson St. and Marina ave. property is being considered.

The edifice, of three story semi-detached design, will have a main auditorium seating capacity of 600 persons, the pastor revealed. The chapel will accommodate 200.
