Emergency Polio Equipment Is Received Here

Emergency polio fighting equipment was rushed to the Harbor General Hospital at Torrance Monday by the Southern California Committee of the Sister Kenny Foundation to increase facilities for the treatment of the dread disease here. The desperately-needed equipment will be used to process Kenny hot packs treatment for patients in three new wards opened at the former Army Port of Embarkation Hospital this week. The new wards will admit the overflow of post-contagion cases from the Los Angeles General Hospital, according to J. E. Smits, superintendent.

Monday's shipment followed on the heels of the delivery by air last week of two iron lungs for the Los Angeles General Hospital by the local Kenny committee.

The shipments are part of the current activities of the committee which include training of Kenny technicians at the Kenny Institute in Minneapolis and establishment in Los Angeles at an early date of a permanent Kenny clinic.

Here's How You Spent Your Tax Dollar In County

Los Angeles County's \$27.19 per capita cost of county government for 1944-45 was spent \$3.55 for general government, \$1.98 for protection to persons and property, 37 cents for health and sanitation, \$1.53 for highways and bridges, \$18.22 for charities and corrections, 89 cents for recreation, education and miscellaneous, and 15 cents for debt payments, California Taxpayers' Association said today.

Over the state as a whole, the counties spent an average of \$26.67 for general county purposes during 1944-45. Of this, an average of \$3.32 per capita was for general government, \$2.20 for protection to persons and property, 78 cents for health and sanitation, \$2.48 for highways and bridges, \$16.55 for charities and corrections, 94 cents for recreation, education and miscellaneous, and 40 cents for debt payments, the association found.

Per capita expenditures for charities and corrections far out-distanced expenditures for any other function of county government in every California county except Alpine, which showed larger expenditures per capita for highways and bridges than for any other purpose.

Lund, who resides at 2118 Cabrillo ave., will direct the Torrance campaign as the city will spearhead a drive to get 263 volunteer workers for the chest to secure the necessary funds from this area to support the more than 150 Community Chest agencies that are serving the residents of Torrance.

A member of the Rotary Club, Lund is also associated with many civic campaigns, and was quoted as declaring that the Community Chest is the most vital organization offering services to Torrance, in that they are supporting a hundred and a half health, welfare, and youth agencies, including the all-important Veterans Service Center, which is serving the entire full community to serve its needs.

"I cannot stress too greatly the importance of securing an adequate number of volunteers, and making this appeal 100% successful for the coming year. We in Torrance have benefited from the Chest in many ways, and we must not fall behind the other communities in raising funds to continue the Chest, but rather, Torrance should lead all the rest."

Unconstitutional, Rules Federal Court On Seizure

A three-judge federal statutory court Thursday ruled unconstitutional the seizure of the Long Beach Federal Savings and Loan Association, and in so doing declared there was improper delegation of legislative authority in the Home Owners Loan Act of 1933.

The seizure last May caused a political quarrel, the president, Thomas A. Gregory, charging that it was done because he planned to be a witness before a Congressional committee investigating the conduct of the Home Loan Bank board.

Asst. U. S. Atty. Ronald Walker said the government will appeal directly to the Supreme Court from the decision, written by U. S. Circuit Judge William E. Orr and concurred in by District Judges Peirson M. Hall and Dave Ling.

The opinion recites that Congress failed to declare a policy with respect to providing rules and regulations for the reorganization, consolidation, merger or liquidation of Federal savings and loan associations, including the power to appoint a conservator or receiver to take charge of the affairs of such an association.

The court compared the Home Owners Loan Act with other Congressional acts which have been held unconstitutional because of improper delegation of authority, and found that the act fails to set up comprehensive and definite statements of policy, standards, guides, criteria and limitations.

Milk Prospect For Future Looks Better, Report

With greater supplies of dairy feeds available at somewhat lower prices, a sufficient number of replacement cows, and enough milkers, Earl Mahars, assistant farm advisor in Los Angeles County, says that the milk situation for Los Angeles is in a favorable condition.

"Enough old-line dairymen are ready to expand their business to care for any needs of the area due to increased population," he said.

"The cowtesting association is testing over 20,000 cows monthly, and the number of herds under test is increasing. This testifies to the interest of dairymen, and, coupled with the monthly importation of 5,000 or more new cows for replacements, shows their willingness and ability to take care of any necessary expansions."
