Time For Santa To Get Started, P. O. Announces

Only 19 more mailing days till Christmas! This warning was issued yesterday by Parcel Post Clerk T. C. Messerve at the Torrance post office. To reach service men and others overseas in time for the happy holiday, he pointed out packages should be on their way not later than Nov. 15. As a special inducement to early mailing, Messerve revealed, Uncle Sam has provided that packages may be mailed without request until that date. Only limitations are that not more than one box a week may be sent from and to the same individuals, and that parcels to armed forces personnel may not exceed 70 lbs. each in weight. For those interested in mailing gifts to relatives or friends abroad, a similar deadline applies, he said, but weight limitations are lower, and vary from country to country. Only gift packages, for instance, may be sent to England, Yugoslavia, Greece, Italy, Austria, France and Germany, while Holland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Denmark and Norway will permit other types, subject to customs duties. Wide variation in requirements of the various countries make it advisable to consult the postmaster before mailing, Messerve said. For instance, packages to Lisbon, Portugal, may range up to 22 lbs. in weight, while those for the interior are limited to 11. Points to remember, he announced, are to wrap package well, using heavy paper, stout cord, corrugated cardboard for reinforcing, the well (and seal, if not directed to a member of the armed forces) check with postal clerk on requirements and, above all...

TRIAL SET DEC. 4 ON ROBERT STOCK NARCOTIC CHARGE

He was quoted as relating he got the prescriptions filled, returned the narcotics to the doctor and received the shots.
