Redondo Beach Gets \$850,000 Appropriation

Redondo Beach, vastly growing neighboring city, is making future plans for the construction of post-war projects, following the approval of an \$850,000 appropriation bill by the State of California and Federal Works Agency.

The beach city's plan to keep up with the fast-moving metropolis of Los Angeles, is headed by a \$300,000 city hall-civic center project. A veteran's memorial hall, fire station and police station are included in this project.

North Redondo will be the site of a new public library and police station, with estimated costs set at \$54,000.

New additions to the municipal park, amounting to \$71,250, will include baseball and playground courts, a bandstand, cement benches, comfort stations, water fountains and landscaping. Widening of several streets, installations of drains and the building of a new city yard will complete the improvement program.

State Guard Aids In Building Of National Guard

One of the present missions of the California State Guard is to help in building up the National Guard, Col. Laurence Mickel, commanding officer of the Southern California area of the State Guard, has informed his unit commanders. He has ordered that entire rosters of men, in the State Guard, with military experience records, be forwarded to his office, according to Major H. F. Thienhaus, commander of the 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment of the State Guard, which includes companies in Long Beach and Torrance.

Eligible members of the California State Guard are being urged to enlist in units of the National Guard, and other California State Guard members are urged to continue their California State Guard activities.

Men who are eligible for the California National Guard are being enlisted in the army in Torrance park. Men 17 years-of-age are especially wanted for enlistment, Captain Lewellen said.

Both Long Beach and Torrance will have units of the California National Guard and it is expected that all members of present State Guard companies will be given opportunity to join the National Guard before the 2nd Battalion is inactivated. Capt. R. L. Lewellen commands Torrance Company H, and Capt. C. C. Church Long Beach Company A. There are also headquarters, service and machine gun units in Long Beach.

ARLINGTON AVE. RESIDENTS HIT PARKING LIMIT

Residents on Arlington ave. between Torrance blvd. and Sierra st. protested to the City Council Tuesday night against the four-hour parking limit on Arlington.

They said that it prevented use of the curb parking area by their own cars, and the matter was referred to the City Council as a whole and Chief of Police John Strohl.

Construction On Seaside Ranchos Tract Undertaken

will initially be limited to veterans, will sell for approximately \$10,000, and they will be of three bedroom construction, with fire places and of varied design. George Marlan is the architect.

John J. Swigart, of Torrance, is paving contractor, and the streets will be of macadam. They will have curbs, walks and gutters.

The new tract was laid out by Harold A. Barnett, engineer, and one 100-foot street will touch 101 highway opposite Tullita ave. It will be known as Robert Road. Four other 80-foot streets will be constructed, branching off Robert Road in keeping with the contour of the land. They will be known as Doris Way, Linda Drive, Sharynne Lane and Reese Road. A few lots will be sold.

The new tract is in Torrance Municipal Water District No. 1, but probably will have to be served by a private company pending the construction of the new pipe lines by the municipal district formed early this year. The private company will be required to surrender its lines to the municipal district when the municipal district is prepared to serve the tract, it is said.

It will also present a new schooling problem for that section, as 140 homes probably will mean some 300 more children for that district. In the recent City Charter election campaign, it was pointed out that the Los Angeles operated Walteria school already is inadequate, and a new school will have to be constructed to serve Walteria, Hollywood Riviera and Seaside Ranchos.

Of the several Torrance tracts initiated since the close of the war, involving more than 1,000 proposed new homes for Torrance, Seaside Ranchos is the first one to get under way, it was pointed out.

Area East Of Torrance Seeks Water District

Eight hundred residents of the unincorporated area east of Torrance and extending to the city limits of Long Beach have a petition asking the Board of Supervisors to bring about formation of what would be known as Dominguez-Lincoln Village and Avalon Village County Water Works district.

The petition said the water works district would constitute an investment of \$2,500,000. The district would embrace an area already served by the pioneer Dominguez Water Corp., which has its plant at Carson st. and Alameda ave.

The district is bounded on the west by Normandie ave., on the north by Victoria ave. and Artesia st., on the east by the city limits of Long Beach and on the south by Lomita blvd.

Behind the move to place this rapidly-growing area in a county water works district was said to be the desire to prevent some of it from being forced into membership in the new West Basin Municipal Water district being formed to bring relief to cities and communities from Ingleswood to Long Beach which face a "water famine" due to dropping of ground water levels and inroads of saline water in coastal wells. The West Basin district will seek membership in the Metropolitan Water district, to which Torrance already belongs.
