Welfare Center Urges Return Of Questionnaires

The postman is going to ring twice for all those neglecting to return their welfare center evaluation questionnaires, announces the Torrance Welfare Center.
 An effort is being launched for securing returns from the 75 per cent who have not yet responded.
 The questionnaires mailed out last September were an attempt to learn the opinion of the public about the welfare center. It was hoped to secure some estimate of the community's knowledge of the center, and to secure suggestions for future publicity.
 The questionnaires were sent to a list of 262 persons in Torrance, Gardena and Lomita. The list was representative of public officials, civic organizations, and school clientele.
 This district had only 25 per cent returns, which is not large enough to justify conclusions, so the Torrance Welfare Center urges all those who received questionnaires to rummage in their desks, and send the answers on their way.

Youth Band In Effort To Raise \$1500

The Torrance Area Youth Band, announced a fund-raising campaign had been launched in an effort to provide \$1,500 for the organization's needs. More than \$450 has been raised to date, according to Vernon Strange, president of the corporation.
