## Holiday Turkey Prices May Be Higher, Report

Every indication points to higher prices for this year's Thanksgiving turkey as compared to 1945, says L. D. Sanborn, assistant farm advisor in Los Angeles county.

He bases his judgment on the fact that there were nearly 30 percent less turkeys raised in California this year and there were fewer turkeys in cold storage on Oct. 1 than a year ago.

Exceedingly limited feed supplies and abnormally high prices during the early part of the year were responsible for the small turkey hatch and resulted in the reduced turkey crop.

High meat costs during the year resulted in greater reduction of storage turkeys, thus reducing the volume in storage.

"All factors considered, it looks to me as though the price for turkeys this coming holiday season will be higher than was paid last Thanksgiving."

## Designer Of Civic Center Buildings Dies

Percy A. Eisen, 60, architect and builder who while associated with A. R. Walker, architect, designed and supervised the construction of most of the Torrance civic center buildings, died Monday night after a heart attack suffered in his office. Funeral services will be conducted at 11 a.m. Friday at Edwards Bros. mortuary, Los Angeles. Interment will be in Forest Lawn Memorial park.

Mr. Eisen, born in San Francisco, came to Los Angeles in 1890 with his father, the late Theodore Eisen, who was commissioned to design the old Los Angeles County Courthouse. During a partnership with A. R. Walker, Percy Eisen worked on such buildings as the Signal Oil, Shell Oil, Ohio Oil, Texas Company, California Hospital, Beverly Wilshire Hotel, Arcady and Gaylord Apartment-Hotels, Security Title Bank, Edwards-Willey, Occidental Life and National City Bank.

Among the Torrance structures which were designed by Walker & Eisen are the Civic Auditorium, City Hall, Public Library, Police Station and the Water Department buildings.

Mr. Eisen leaves his widow, Ruth P. Eisen, of 1990 E. Mountain st., Pasadena; four children, Jack, William, Jean and Ruth, and a brother, Dr. Edward G. Eisen.

Airfields, \$50 per year.  
Ball bonds, \$50 per year.  
Billiard parlors of pool halls, \$50 a year plus \$5 a table.  
Book agents, \$5 a day per agent.  
Bowling academies, \$48 per year.  
Boxing and wrestling, \$25 per day.  
Circuses and carnivals, \$50 a day.  
Cleaners and dyers from out of town, \$36 a year.  
Coffee, tea, spice routes, \$24 per vehicle per year.  
General contractors, \$50 a year, others, \$24.  
Creameries, retail and wholesale, \$36 a year.  
Dairy routes, both retail and wholesale, \$36 a year.  
Distribution of bills, posters, samples, etc., \$50 a day.  
Hog ranches, \$50 a year.  
Hotels, \$6 a year plus \$1 per unit more than six.  
House movers, \$50 a year.  
Junk and second hand dealers, \$100 a year.  
Laundry with routes, \$100 a year, with many conditions.  
Linen supplies, \$36 a vehicle per year.  
Lunch wagons on public streets, \$24 a year for each cart, tray or basket; \$36 for each wagon or automobile.  
Music boxes, \$24 a year plus \$5 for each machine, (presumed to be for operators of more than one music box.)  
Oil wells, \$12 per year for each producing well.  
Petroleum routes, \$20 for each vehicle.  
Police patrols, \$50 per year.  
Public address systems or sound trucks, \$1 a day.  
Wholesale routes of those not having established place of business in Torrance, \$18 per year per vehicle.  
Sewing machine agents, non-resident, \$5 a day.  
Soliciting and canvassing, \$50 per agent per year, if on annual basis, or \$5 per day.  
Soliciting for photographic work, outside, \$36 a year.  
Taxi service, \$25 per year per vehicle.  
Water routes, \$15 per year.  
The effective date of the ordinance, it is reported, is on Jan. 15, 1947, and certain penalties are provided.

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## SUPERVISORS SEEK FEDERAL AID ON NEEDED PROJECTS

The Board of Supervisors will ask the Federal Works Agency for \$153,250 advance to prepare plans for five county projects which the Federal government will help finance.

The projects and construction costs are: A psychopathic unit at General Hospital, \$1,750,000; a new probation camp for boys, \$450,000; slaughterhouse at the sheriff's Wayside Honor Farm, \$65,000; fire protection work at Patriotic hall, \$50,000 and a new morgue building with offices for the coroner and public administrator, \$750,000.
