## Many New Teachers In Torrance Schools As New Semester Starts

Torrance school children started the final semester under Los Angeles city schools control this week with many new teachers occupying positions held by Los Angeles veterans who had been transferred to schools throughout the vast Los Angeles system.

The most important position to change hands was that of principal of Torrance high school.

Miss Helen Jewett Rogers succeeded Raymond J. Casey as principal of the high school. The new principal was introduced at an aud call on Monday morning.

Casey became principal of Belmont high school in Los Angeles.

Miss Rogers' first teaching assignment was at Edison Junior High in Los Angeles. She also taught at Manual Arts High and North Hollywood Junior High and was a demonstration teacher at U.S.C. At these schools she taught social studies, English and some journalism. For five years Miss Rogers was a supervisor of English and social living in the secondary schools of the Los Angeles city school system, and she has been on the staff of summer workshops for teachers in Los Angeles, teaching English and speech.

Her first position as an administrative officer was as vice principal at Berendo Junior High in Los Angeles. Before she came to Torrance, she was vice principal at Gage Junior High in Huntington Park. While at Gage, she was acting principal for a short time.

Miss Rogers is past president of the Junior High Vice Principals' association of Los Angeles, and of Pi Lambda Theta, Sigma Chapter, a national honorary sorority for women in education. She is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, and at present is vice president of the Altrusa

club in Los Angeles, a service club for women.

Miss Rogers has lived at 1215 Crenshaw Blvd., Los Angeles.

Miss Janice Miller, new teacher in the Home Economics department, comes from Connellsville, Pennsylvania, where she attended Carnegie Institute of Technology at Pittsburgh. Miss Miller has taught at San Pedro, South Gate and Venice high schools.

Mrs. Etta Lampel, also from Pennsylvania, attended school at Cedar Crest college. She is teaching shorthand, business law and salesmanship in the commercial department.

Miss Roni J. Leitner, who attended high school in Chicago, obtained her degree from Chicago Teachers college. She has taught girls' physical education several years at Gomer's Junior high school.

At Walteria elementary school Miss Elizabeth Warren, principal, was transferred and Harry Sams, of the Fries ave. school in Wilmington, succeeded to the Walteria principalship.

Mrs. Carolyn Blackman, principal of Fern ave. school announced three new teachers to the staff, one of which was made necessary due to the school's enrollment passing the 500 mark. An additional classroom was added for this purpose. Mrs. Margaret Conkling, A-2 and B-3 teacher, will be in charge.

Miss Laura Mae Thomas, sixth grade teacher who had taught in the Fern ave. school for the past 16 years and in Torrance schools since 1920, received her transfer to Orange st. school in Lomita. She is replaced by Mrs. Mariam T. Weisbecker.

Mrs. Ina Burge, second grade teacher, has been transferred to Miles ave. school in Huntington Park. Mrs. Birdie Rhoades will make the replacement.
