Dairies Seek Early Water Connections

That the North Torrance water system will be completed and become a paying proposition earlier than at first anticipated, was indicated this week by reports that dairymen are seeking early connections for their many farms in the northeast section of this city.

One leader in the formation of the new water district said that along Arlington ave., Crenshaw Blvd. and 174th st., there are a half dozen large dairies and some 20 to 30 houses, the owners of which are seeking immediate connection for water service. Their effort is spurred by the plan to construct the first main along Crenshaw Blvd. to serve new subdivisions there.

It is pointed out that serving the dairies in northeast Torrance together with the residences along the route will provide an immediate substantial income for water district and a means for expanding the new system.

Pipe is on order for the system and orders in small lots are being picked up from time to time to speed construction of the network of mains to serve the North Torrance area.

It is said that half dozen subdivisions are ready to start a mammoth home construction program in the North Torrance area as soon as water becomes available.
