The Golden Text of the Sunday Lesson—Sermon "Mind" in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, is from Romans, and reads, "O the depth of the riches, both of the wisdom and knowledge of God; how unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!" In a Bible selection from Matthew, Jesus says, "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin; and yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. . . Therefore take no thought, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'Wherewithal shall we be clothed?' . . . for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Mary Baker Eddy writes in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "Be firm in your understanding that the divine Mind governs, and that in Science man reflects God's government." Again she says, "Sickness, sin, and death must at length yield before the divine rights of intelligence, and then the power of Mind over the entire material system and organs of the human functions will be acknowledged."

The accident was said to have occurred when a car driven by William Clegg, 67, Los Angeles, collided with an auto driven by John Giminez, 40, 1616 W. 252nd st., which in turn bounced into an automobile operated by C. C. Peterson, 35, Long Beach.

The Peterson vehicle careened out of control and overturned. Clegg suffered fractured ribs, and his wife, Mrs. Wm. Clegg, 63, sustained possible internal injuries. Giminez suffered multiple lacerations about the face and body, and his wife, Mrs. Louise Giminez, received a possible fractured hip. Peterson received severe injuries to his right shoulder.

All the injured were taken to Wilmington emergency hospital and later transferred to private hospitals.
