THE WORLD'S COLDEST AIR ROUTE

Little does the world know, or care, about the terrific struggle against almost unbelievable cold weather to create an air route north of the Arctic Circle over ten thousand miles of barren wastes and frozen tundra—from Great Falls, Montana, to Moscow, Russia. In 1942 aviation, then a tottering industry, faced such a daring challenge to deliver fighting aircraft to the Russians from our American factories to defeat the success of the German U-boat.

At fifty degrees below zero aviation was frozen to a complete standstill. Smooth rubber tires froze solid to ice and snow, oil congealed in lines stiffer than the average walking cane, engines froze up so that propellers could not be turned without the danger of twisting crankshafts, thin layers of frost on wings destroyed their lifting qualities and cockpits were a veritable "Frozen Hell" for the pilots. Added to this was the startling knowledge that few persons knew how to live and survive in the Arctic.

Americans leaned on the Russian Arctic experiences, but these turned out to be crude, undependable and hopeless because they built open fires in the airplane cabins to keep warm in flight, used flame-throwers to warm up the engines and filled their anti-icing tanks with vodka for airplane and pilots. American ingenuity, plus the will to win, attacked the problem scientifically point-by-point.

Heat Put On 'Hot Rods' In Easter Drive

There'll be more gas cooking in the "pots" of the hopped-up cars that annually descend on Newport-Balboa for the Easter vacation period unless their youthful drivers make sure that the "hot rods" are equipped with legal mufflers before they visit that city, says Chief of Police John Stroh. Last year a total of 618 traffic citations were issued during the single week by Newport-Balboa police and the greater part of these citations went to young drivers of "hopped-up" jobs.

This year, in accordance with Governor Warren's Traffic Safety campaign, an intensified drive will be conducted during Easter week against all illegally equipped and operated vehicles. "If you want to rap 'em," be prepared to take the rap," is the advice of Chief of Police E. R. Hodgkinson of Newport Beach in a message to Chief Stroh.

Riviera Home Burglarized In Daylight Raid

A burglar entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred R. Crommelin, 317 Calle Mayor, Hollywood Riviera, last week and carried off nearly \$2,000 in loot, including a \$1,200 diamond ring. Another ring valued at \$400, a lady's wrist watch at \$160 and \$26 in cash were also taken. The intruder apparently entered the house while Mrs. Crommelin was working in the yard of her home during the afternoon, police stated. The articles were evidently taken in haste, since a very valuable diamond ring and a string of pearls were overlooked, investigating officers said.

Man Injured In Car-Train Collision

A Lawndale man suffered minor injuries early Monday morning when his automobile collided with a train at the Santa Fe crossing on Crenshaw Blvd. W. E. Barnett, 4446 W. 168th St., Lawndale reported to police that after the collision the train did not stop, evidently unaware of the accident. Mr. Barnett was taken to Harbor General hospital and released after treatment.

Palos Verdes Subdivision Approved


