Department Of Veteran Affairs Offers Refund

The State Department of Veterans Affairs has nearly half a million dollars to refund to 1500 California veterans of World War I, but so far has not been able to locate them to give them the money, Director Lawrence C. Stevens announced today.

The refunds, averaging \$287.73 per veteran, represent a "loading" charge, which was collected for many years as part of the down payment on property purchased for veterans by the State under the California Farm and Home Purchase program.

Purpose of the charge was to build up a reserve fund to meet possible contingencies in operation of the program. Far from losing money, however, the department built up a reserve of nearly \$10,000,000 over a 25-year period while assisting more than 15,000 World War I veterans to obtain homes and farms.

The department has attempted to locate the remaining 1,500 eligible veterans, but notices have been returned for lack of forwarding addresses. The amount involved is approximately \$430,000.

U.S. Rubber Co. Fellowship In Chemistry Set Up

United States Rubber Co. post-graduate fellowships in chemistry have been established on the Los Angeles and Berkeley campuses of the University of California, President Robert Gordon Sproul announced today.

The fellowships, which will be awarded annually to male students working toward Ph.D. degrees in chemistry, will become available July 1. Fellowship winners will receive \$1,200 per year if single, \$1,800 if married. In addition, the university will receive \$1,000 annually for each fellowship to cover fees and laboratory expenses.

The United States Rubber Co. has established similar predoctoral fellowships at a number of other American universities to contribute to the growth of academic chemistry.

FARM HOUSE SHORT RIBS

2 tbsps. finely chopped suet or	1 cup hot water
1 1/2 tbsps. shortening	1 teaspoon salt
3 lbs. Short Ribs	1/2 teaspoon pepper

Heat suet or shortening in heavy kettle with tight fitting cover. Add meat and brown slowly, turning frequently. Add water, salt and pepper. Cover and cook slowly until meat is tender, about 1 1/2 hours. Remove meat. Serve 6. Note: Serve liquid as natural or add 2 1/2 cups water and thicken with 5 tablespoons flour.


