New Sugar Stamp Good On April 1, O.P.A. Reports

The office of temporary controls announced spare stamp No. 11 in OPA family ration books will become good April 1 for 10 pounds of sugar.

Validation of the 10-pound stamp will mark OPA's change-over from the 5-pound ration procedure for household users. The current stamp No. 53, good for five pounds, will expire March 31.

Stamp No. 11 will be good through Sept. 30 but OPA said a second stamp good for 10 pounds will be validated July 1 providing sugar imports meet expectations.

OPA officials said it is possible that still another 10 pounds, bringing the year's total for household users to 35, may be made available Sept. 30.

O.P.A. emphasized that new stamps being validated include sugar for both regular home and canning use. No separate stamps will be issued for canning. Last year household users got 15 pounds of sugar for regular use and 10 for home canning.

20-30 Club Plans Program For New Year

In keeping with their record for services rendered the community, the Torrance 20-30 Club has planned an ambitious program for the coming year. Included in the plans are: Another float for the 1948 Tournament of Roses at Pasadena; aid in the 1947 Cancer Drive, backing of local recreation, particularly for children, and assisting in prevention of juvenile delinquency.

The 20-30 Club was re-chartered October, 1946, after being inactive during the war because of participation of its members in the various armed services. Since its re-activation, the organization has raised funds and supervised construction of the first float ever to represent Torrance in the annual Rose Parade. It placed second in its classification. The club also furnished assistants to officials in conducting Torrance Recreation basketball league; furnished two men weekly to aid teen-age club stage their Saturday night dances; donated perpetual trophy for the recreation basketball league and individual trophies to winning team members.

The club conducts its meetings each Wednesday evening at Vurp's Cafe. The present officers are: Van H. Barnard, president; Charles "Chuck" Hutherson, vice-president; Howard E. Foster, secretary-treasurer; and Joe Weislinger, sergeant at arms.

Caldwell Urges Vets To Renew NSLI Policies

J. G. Caldwell, of the Torrance Veterans Service center, today called the attention of veterans to newly liberalized features of National Service Life Insurance, including an extension of time for reinstatement of lapsed policies without a physical examination.

On the basis of a bill passed by Congress and signed by President Truman, a veteran may, until August 1 of this year, reinstate his term insurance merely by signing a statement that his health is as good now as at the time the policy lapsed, and paying two monthly premiums.

Caldwell pointed out that many veterans who cannot now pass a physical examination for insurance are able to reinstate their NSLI policies under this provision, and thus obtain needed protection which may never again be available to them.

Attention is especially called to an outstanding provision of the new legislation which eliminates a previous requirement that term insurance had to be in effect for a year before it could be converted to a permanent plan. Policies now may be issued initially for any one of the various forms of permanent insurance, or term policies may be converted at any time.

The new act also provides, in certain cases, for automatic conversion of term insurance to a permanent plan for policy holders who are totally disabled. Premiums are waived on all NSLI policies during continuance of total disability for six or more consecutive months.
