Charter Group Chosen As City Education Board

nor spend money until after July 1, 1947, it is possible to make necessary arrangements for initial expenditures through the county office, it was said.

The Board of Education must start immediately hiring teachers and other personnel preparatory to operation of the elementary schools next September. Torrance High School will be operated by the Redondo Union High School Board of Trustees, for the first year, as a result of the vote of the people on January 24.

Total vote cast in the election Tuesday was 1673, approximately 45 per cent of the total qualified.

A survey of polling finds that Thatcher, Walteria resident, defeated Lynch in his (Thatcher's) own precincts. In the Walteria precinct No. 12, Thatcher received 80 votes to 10 for Lynch. In No. 16, Thatcher got 94 votes to Lynch's 7. Lynch out-pollled Thatcher in most other precincts but not sufficiently to overcome the lead of the popular Walteria home owner.

That the Walteria vote was largely one of "protest," since the precincts there include the strongly anti-Torrance Hollywood Riviera section, was indicated by the fact that Mrs. Carr and Mrs. Wright made very poor showing there. On the other hand Mrs. Millard, who vigorously opposed the City Charter and withdrawal of the Torrance schools from Los Angeles, had a strong vote in Southwest Torrance. She polled 149 votes in the two precincts. Mrs. Carr, who was chairman of the Torrance Parents association which initiated the school withdrawal campaign in 1944, received only 27 votes in the same area. Mrs. Wright, active worker in the P. T. A. and on the Charter Committee, received only 32 votes in that section.

Mrs. Carr and Mrs. Wright held their strength in all other sections, however.

No candidate carried the highest number of votes in all precincts, but Dr. Wood's strength approached such a showing. He was high throughout the city, except in Walteria.

Mrs. Carr and Mrs. Wright were strong favorites in 10 precincts, Carl Steele was "in the money" throughout the city, except in the Walteria area.

Thatcher proved a strong candidate, and the showing of Lynch was a vigorous, but not sufficient, endorsement of his activities in behalf of better schools of Torrance during the past several years.

Coast Guard Academy Seeks Candidates

The United States Coast Guard Academy at New London, Conn., is accepting applicants for the 1947 entrance examination. Adm. Joseph F. Farley, Coast Guard commandant announced today.

Applicants must be between the ages of 17 and 22. Physical requirements include 20/20 vision and a minimum height of five feet six inches. High school scholastic requirements include two years of algebra, one year of plane geometry, three years of English and one year of physics. For the first time, trigonometry will not be required. Applicants for the examinations will be accepted until March 31. The tests will be held May 7 and 8 in key cities throughout the U. S., to be announced later.

Those who qualify will not need Congressional appointment for acceptance to the academy.
