Sell The World On Americanism Or Lose Freedom

So you like your freedom and individuality? Well, you are going to have to do some selling to retain it.

This is apparent from a statement by Dr. Frederick Osborn that people of the world whose ideas about self-government and freedom agree with the American concept are outnumbered by an even billion.

The doctor, who is director of the Social Science Research Council, stated further that the odds are getting worse. "We are going to have to do some pretty fancy missionary work," he said, "otherwise we will be swamped by quite alien cultures in which life is held very cheap and in which the individual and his right to the pursuit of happiness are negligible."

At present there are 600,000,000 persons sharing a tradition of self-government and freedom; the rest number about 1,600,000,000—one billion more. It is further estimated that the ratio in 25 years may be 600,000,000 to 2,060,000,000.

Americans have every reason to sell their form of economic life to others. With but 7 percent of the world's population, Americans own 54 percent of the world's telephones, 84 percent of the world's automobiles, nearly half the radios, 92 percent of all the bath-tubs on this sphere, 50,000,000 savings bank accounts and 70,000,000 life insurance policies.

Furthermore, we spend more than \$4,000,000 a day for tickets to the movies alone. This lion's share of the world's goods and services was all produced under our system of free enterprise—private competitive business with the emphasis on individual enterprise and freedom.

Romberg To Give Recital Of Own Songs April 16

Sigmund Romberg, composer of some of the greatest love songs of our generation, is scheduled to play personally these song hits when he brings his orchestra and soloists to the Long Beach Municipal auditorium for one performance on April 16.

The most famous Romberg love song is the thrilling "Love Come Back To Me" from "New Moon." "New Moon" was written in 1927, fifteen years after the composer's first melodious ballad swept across the country, "Sweetheart (Will You Remember)" from "Maytime." Since then the Romberg genius has contributed a great library of songs to the American theater.

Discharges Other Than Honorable May Be Appealed

Many veterans who feel they did not receive justice in being given a discharge other than honorable have the right to appeal for a review of their discharge. J. G. Caldwell said today.

The only provisions which prohibit such a review are that the discharge must not have been dishonorable and it must not have been the result of a general court martial. All other discharges other than honorable are eligible for review.

A veteran wishing to apply for a review of his discharge is advised to bring to the Torrance Area Veterans Service Center at 1339 Post Avenue, Torrance, California, a copy of his discharge papers and letters of character reference. J. G. Caldwell will assist him in filling a form stating his reasons for appealing the decision.

Although all reviews of discharge are handled in Washington, the papers are drawn up and the case presented through the local office.
