**50 Teachers Are Hired For City School System**

Some 50 teachers already have been selected for Torrancia City Schools, Superintendent of Schools J. H. Hull told the Board of Education Tuesday night.

He recommended the election of a group, declaring that probably 20 percent will not accept their contracts.

Some 70 teachers will be needed, Hull declared, to adequately handle the 2100 students of Torrancia elementary schools next year. There is a real shortage, he said, in kindergarten teachers, only three having been selected.

Teachers being hired range in pay from \$2700 to \$3200, depending upon experience and years of service.

Several joint contracts are being worked out with Redondo Union High School district. These include the attendance officer, Furnam A. Applegate, who will receive \$1100, with Torrancia paying \$1,367 of the salary, and Vivian Markham \$2800, of which Torrancia will pay one-half.

Names of teachers elected will be announced as contracts are accepted, Hull said.
