

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**Lomita Soldier Stationed In Tokyo Area**

Pfc William E. Pruitt, of Lomita, is serving with the famed Fighting 1st Cavalry Division in its occupation of the ten prefectures in the Tokyo-Yokohama area. The 1st Cavalry, also known as the "First Team," is commanded by Major General William C. Chase.

**Suggested Policies For Adoption By Board Of Education Are Given**

Policies of the Torrance City Board of Education which are being considered for adoption were revealed at a meeting of the Torrance Education Advisory Council in Daniels' cafe on Thursday.

Presented by Superintendent of Schools J. Heinrich Hull, the policies are outlined below that they might be given general discussion among the people of Torrance who have indicated an interest in their schools far greater than that demonstrated by the patrons of other school districts, it was said.

The suggested policies, to be considered by the Board of Education at its next meeting, follow:

**1. Administration.**—The Board of Education selects the Superintendent of Schools. In the superintendent is vested full authority as the chief executive officer of the school system and the Board of Education. The Superintendent or designated staff member, shall keep the board continually informed concerning all matters pertaining to school policy, financial condition of the school system, the organization and operation of the plant and the efficiency of the staff.

**2. Educational Program.**—The educational program shall be organized under the superintendent in accordance with sound educational practice and cooperation of the personnel of the entire staff, keeping the interests of the children of the community paramount.

**3. Scope of Educational Program.**—The educational program includes kindergarten and eight grades of elementary education.

**4. Public Relations.**—  
 a. To support a program which, when fully understood, will stand the scrutiny of a majority of parents, teachers, students and taxpayers.  
 b. To encourage community interest and participation in the school program.  
 c. To utilize information, advice and assistance of interested individuals and groups in the solution of the educational and financial problems.  
 d. To provide the community with official information about school policies and the content of the school program. (For this purpose a reasonable expenditure of tax funds will be approved.)  
 e. To encourage the use of a variety of the available, reliable means of informing the community about its schools.  
 f. To endorse a planned program designed to discover the community's needs and desires in educational services and expenditures.  
 g. To encourage recognition of those who serve public education in the community.

**5. Program Content.**—It is the policy of the Board of Education that the content of the school program be reviewed annually with a realistic evaluation of past experience. The need for the program for the children of the community, the availability of competent, trained personnel shall be considered as well as the financial ability of the budget to attract and hold the necessary personnel to fulfill the objectives of any portion of the program shall be regularly reviewed.

**6. Personnel.**—It is the policy of the board to employ better than average certificated employees when possible and to grant tenure upon the basis of their

record during the probationary period. (Tenure is by selection rather than an automatic result of time in service in Torrance). It is the policy of the board to employ in both certificated and non-certificated positions, individuals of the best obtainable ability, training and reliability within the drawing power of the established salary schedule and the normal attractions of the community.

Employees shall be selected upon a professional or merit basis without regard to religious, political or factional influences. Employees shall be bonded when performing duties involving the handling of large sums of money.

**7. Salaries.**—The board has adopted a single salary schedule for the entire instructional staff. Salary increases will be based upon experience, training and professional qualifications, as worked out by a joint committee of board members, teachers and administrators and approved by the Board of Education.

The Board of Education plans to maintain a salary schedule which will assure teachers and other employees an adequate standard of living with due regard to the limitations of the budget.

**8. Financial and Managerial.**—To conduct the business of the school district efficiently and economically, and in conformance with the spirit and letter of the laws of the State of California, and within these bonds to formulate policy and determine the functions to be performed by the school system in the interests of the educational welfare of children of the community.

Within the limits of legality and sound business practice the board recognizes the desirability of doing business with local merchants and supporting local enterprises.

The business functions shall be organized under the superintendent in keeping with sound business practice and thoroughly legal procedure.

Financial policies must be guided by the limitations of the budget and "ability to pay." A reasonable margin of reserve for emergency considerations shall be established as soon as possible.

**9. Instructional Materials.**—It is the policy of the Board of Education:  
 a. To provide instructional and educational supplies and equipment within the purchasing power of the budget, which will contribute the most to the educative process in the school program.  
 b. To encourage certificated employees to select the supplies and materials which have most educational value.  
 c. To insist upon the use of the facilities of the business office for all materials and services purchased with tax funds.

**10. School Plant and Equipment**—To provide safe, sanitary and serviceable school buildings in locations for all children and equipment necessary for the efficient use of the plant.

**11. New Buildings.**—It is the policy of the Board of Education to buy as much permanent educational value per dollar as it is

possible to obtain and still be consistent with safety of construction and economy of upkeep.

**12. Grounds.**—To attempt to foresee the educational growth of the community and purchase grounds in strategic locations to meet future school plant and educational needs.

To provide such attractive landscape settings as are consistent with reasonable economy in cost and operation.

To provide the grounds necessary for an adequate program of physical education and recreation for all children.

**13. Insurance.**—To maintain adequate fire insurance protection on all buildings based upon replacement costs and maintenance of coverage which will result in minimum risk for the expense of emergency replacement of major construction to maintain standard types of school coverage.

**14. Transportation.**—To maintain a adequate transportation service in those situations where accessibility is otherwise unattainable.

**15. Maintenance Supplies and Equipment.** To provide maintenance supplies and equipment which will result in the most effective economies over a period of years consistent with good maintenance service to all school property.

To maintain school plant and equipment in first class condition by a planned continuing program of repairing, reconditioning and remodeling based upon need, and methods that will result in the most effective economies when measured in terms of long range continued upkeep.

To maintain competent and adequate supervision of buildings and grounds, and a system of periodic inspection which will result in decreasing the frequency of need for major repair through frequent and systematic repair of little things.

**16. Cafeterias.**—To maintain ca-

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feteria facilities for hot lunches where advisable.

**17. Cash Accounts.**—All cash accounts connected with school activities shall be recorded in pre-numbered receipt books and ledger entries shall be made in corresponding numerical order.

**18. Building Program.**—It shall be the policy of the Board of Education to examine the possibility and feasibility of a "pay as you go" program of expansion of buildings and facilities to meet the demands of the growing school population of Torrance before presenting bond issues to the voters.

**Other Suggested Policies**—It shall be the policy of all board members to consider themselves representatives of the entire community, including all groups, rather than any one segment, organization or geographical area.

This does not preclude the full utilization by the Board of any information that one member may have because of membership in a particular group, segment or geographical location in the school district.

It is recommended that the board adopt a policy that kindergarten teachers must have been four (4) years old on March 15 in order to be eligible for kindergarten and that first (1st) graders must have been five (5) years old on March 15 in order to be eligible for first grade on September 15, 1947; and that this policy be rigidly adhered to and that there be no admission to either first grade or kindergarten in the middle of the year.
