School Life Of 'John and Mary' At Torrance Hi Described By Principal

"What are the new school teachers and principal going to be like? Am I going to enjoy school as much as I did last year? Will I get to elect subjects? What kind of a student body organization will we have?"

Questions similar to these are probably running through the minds of John and Mary, whom we have chosen as being representative junior high school students. By way of answering some of these queries let's follow John and Mary through what will be typical day at Torrance junior high this next year.

They will both arrive at school in the morning either by walking or by providing their own means of transportation or by riding the school bus if they are eligible. When the opening bells ring at 8:20 a.m., John and Mary will report to their home room class or classes. If the enrollment meets our expectations there will be ten of these home rooms—five for the seventh graders and five for the eighth. During the course of the school day John and Mary will be with the same homeroom teachers for at least 4 periods. The senior high school periods are to be 55 minutes in length. It was thought best to make the junior high schedule coincide insofar as this period length was concerned. This enables both schools to use the same schedule of bells with but one or two deviations.

John and Mary are typical young people. They are probably going to expect not only to learn the necessary fundamentals which will enable them to be successful in senior high and in life, but they are also perhaps going to ask for a little fun and recreation as well. Their first expectation—knowledge of the fundamentals—will be satisfied by close adherence to the Los Angeles County Course of Study. In it we find the following subjects: social studies and related sciences, language (oral and written), spelling, reading, arithmetic, handwriting, literature, art, music, practical arts and physical education.

Many of these subjects are inter-related and are best learned when presented in such a way as to emphasize these inter-relationships. It was thought best to have John and Mary with the same teachers most of the day. Much better pupil-teacher relationship is obtained in this way as both teachers and pupils grow to know each other more fully. In addition to the help John and Mary will receive from their homeroom teachers they will also receive special remedial help in reading and arithmetic from a different teacher if they are in need of such help. Each of the 10 homeroom teachers will have 4 periods of remedial work each week. It is hoped that these remedial classes will be small enough to permit an individual-type instruction of those who are deficient in these subjects. Other subjects may be added to the remedial program if conditions warrant.

If Mary is especially gifted in art and music she should be pleased to hear that these subjects are to be offered by special teachers. Each pupil will receive 2 periods of art and 2 periods of music per week. In addition to this, special teachers in instrumental music will be provided. John's love of athletics will be heightened by the special physical education teacher for boys. A woman teacher will do the same thing for the girls. The services of a school doctor and

nurse will provide physical examinations and enable the school to gear its health and physical education programs more closely to the needs of the pupils.

Every Wednesday and Friday during the recess period John and Mary will have an opportunity to choose a club of their liking. Each teacher will be in charge of a special club. The nature of the club program will depend upon the interests of the pupils. Such things as shop, gardening, sewing, cooking and the like will probably attract a great many students. The club program will be recreational in nature.

As in the past, John and Mary will have their recess period every morning for 15 minutes. A special lunch period for junior high pupils only will occur daily from 11:30 to 12:10. Arrangements regarding the use of the cafeteria are pending and cafeteria service for the junior high will probably be available. It is impossible at this time to make a definite statement in this regard.

If either John or Mary have political aspirations they will find an outlet for their talents in the student body organization. Some form of student government will come into being, as a means of promoting the general welfare of the school. John and Mary will have a definite part in the creation of the student body organization, for no attempt is being made to do this before school opens.

In our efforts to depict a typical day at Torrance junior high, it has been necessary to describe more than one day in order to give the reader a picture of life at Torrance junior high. This should send John and Mary home each day at 3:05 with a realization that they have had an opportunity to learn the fundamentals and at the same time develop their special interests.

Torrance Pupils Transportation Being Considered

Adequate means of transporting Torrance pupils to their schools is now being considered by local school officials. Problems as to most effective utilization of the three buses expected to be in operation and the providing of transportation for those children living in outlying areas such as the Hollywood Riviera and northeast Torrance, remain to be ironed out before any definite policy can be stated.

According to the State Education Code a standard of one and one-half miles has been set as the maximum walking distance. Practice, however, has varied from picking everyone up to making all children walk who live less than two miles from the school.

The car which the Gibson car struck, immediately drove away from the scene of the accident, although no blame would have been attached to the unknown driver for the crash, it was said. The two injured women were removed to the Torrance Memorial hospital by B. A. Davis of Lomita, who drove up immediately following the accident.
