


SALMON GOOD

Handbook Gives Changes Made By State Legislature

"It's a Law" the final handbook report of Vincent D. Kennedy, managing director of the California Retailers Association, covering important changes made in the California Statutes at the Fifty-seventh Session of the Legislature, now is available.

Although some 4,500 bills and resolutions were introduced during the recent Session, this concise report is concerned only with legislation which affects the California Retailer. Except as otherwise noted in the text, the new laws take effect on September 19, 1947.

13,000 Increase Over Last Year Expected In L. A. City Schools

When schools open on Sept. 15, approximately 311,270 students will enroll in the Los Angeles City schools. During the school year this enrollment is expected to exceed the half-million mark. Of this number nearly 300,000 will be in average daily attendance in our schools during 1947-48.

This represents an increase in school population of almost 13,000 over last year. While 14 new schools were established during the past school year, plans call for the establishment of an additional 18 new schools during the first semester of the coming year in order to meet the housing requirements of increased school population, plus a reduction of one to two students in the size of classes.

Reduction in the size of classes, which is a reduction in the "teacher norm," constitutes a long-needed improvement in the classroom learning situation in our schools.

Clarence W. Pierce School of Agriculture will begin operating with the opening of schools this year headed by Dr. Edwin B. Angier and located on 400 acres in San Fernando Valley. The school will offer instruction in the following fields: ornamental horticulture and landscape gardening, meat animal production, fruit production (deciduous and citrus), crop production (field and truck), and dairy production and manufacturing. Enrollment on the first day is expected to be approximately 350.
