Election For Unification January 15

Board of Education, the Torrance City Board of Education, the Redondo Union High School District Board of Trustees, W. K. Cobb, superintendent of the Redondo district, Carpenter and Hull. All of these persons will be in Sacramento at that time attending the state trustees convention.

Under the state law, it was necessary for the people of Torrance upon adoption of the City Charter providing for formation of Torrance City School District to pick an adjoining high school district for secondary education purposes the first year of operation of the Torrance City Schools. These districts are Los Angeles or Redondo.

The voters of Torrance, with the approval of the Redondo trustees and with the understanding that unification would take place so that Torrance could take over the high school in 1948, voted 10 to one in favor of Redondo.

All preparations of the Redondo trustees for operation of the high school have been in close harmony with the Torrance Board of Education, and the switch from Redondo to Torrance control of the high school will be accomplished after the unification without the disharmony which marked the withdrawal from Los Angeles, it is said.

Torrance more than doubled the Redondo assessed valuation for school purposes this year, and it is in this manner, and in receiving the state school support funds next year, that Redondo is being paid for operation of the high school here.

Redondo will get approximately \$330,000 in tax funds and more than \$50,000 in state school funds for operating the high school this year. Equipment which has been purchased will be purchased in turn by Torrance, and most of the teaching staff was named with the intention of their remaining with the school.

Redondo's current expenses (this year's operation) is \$687,515 for both Torrance and Redondo high schools, as compared with \$455,500 for the Redondo school alone last year. Capital outlay costs will be offset next year when Torrance reimburses Redondo for future and equipment purchased for Torrance, this figure being in addition to the current expense cost. This it appears the additional cost for operating Torrance high school this year is \$232,115.

22 Evening High Classes Open In Torrance

At the pre-opening registration for evening school classes held at Torrance High School on Wednesday evening, more than 225 persons signed up for classes, indicating their definite interests for evening school activities.

As a follow-through from the pre-opening registration, 22 classes have been in operation this past week. New classes will be added as soon as teachers can be located and the registration for the class reaches 15 students.

Classes now in operation at the high school include Health and Recreation for men and women, sewing, woodwork, drafting, Spanish — both beginning and advanced, public speaking, citizenship and history, basic and advanced English, mathematics, shorthand, typing, floristry, arts and crafts, vocal and instrumental music.

Classes start at 7 and run to 9 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each week. A full schedule for the week will appear in the next issue of the Torrance Herald.

New 'Y' Man Arrives

L. Milton Isbell arrived in Torrance Monday to take over his post as new executive secretary of the Torrance YMCA. His job will be to handle all affairs pertaining to the YMCA here as the only paid employee in the organization.

Isbell has spent the last 10 years working with youth, except for three years in service. His last post was that of boys' secretary of the central branch of the Houston, Tex. YMCA.

A 1937 graduate of Texas Wesleyan college, Fort Worth, where he was a quarterback on the football team and captain in his senior year, Isbell went directly to a football coaching position at Cleburne, Texas, high school.

After five years as coach and physical education instructor, he switched to YMCA work and was boys' secretary of the "Y" in Lake Charles, La. It was from this position that he went into the Navy.

Fines For City Court In August Reach \$3278.50

From Aug. 1 to and including Aug. 31, 1947, the City Court of the City of Torrance received \$3,278.50 net from fines and fees. Of this sum \$1,167.00 are general fund monies, while \$2,111.50 came from vehicle violations and thus are road fund monies.

General fund monies were collected from the following cases: Drunkenness, \$495.00; boulevard stop, \$256.00; parking and U-turn, \$86.00 and miscellaneous criminal violations, \$330.00.

Road fund monies were derived from the following cases: Drunk driving, \$505.00; speeding, \$1,064.50 and miscellaneous traffic violations, \$542.00.
