MISSION PLAY TO OPEN SEASON ON OCTOBER 9

John Steven McGroarty's vision of a permanent Mission Play dramatizing the story of the founding of early California takes a step nearer materialization today, October 9, when the fall 1947 season of the Mission Play opens in its own Mission Playhouse in San Gabriel. McGroarty died believing his dream had not come true. The Mission Play which he had written in 1912 ran until 1932, a record of twenty-one seasons, playing to over 2,000,000 people.

In 1947 a group of loyal Californians rallied to form the Mission Play Foundation which brought the play to new life under the supervision of Adrian Awan. Last spring its trial run played seven weeks to capacity crowds, and the idea for a regularly planned annual presentation took root.

With Pedro de Cordoba again interpreting the exacting role of Fra Junipero Serra, and supported by a cast of 100 singers and dancers, the Mission Play will be presented on Friday and Saturday nights, Friday, Saturday and Sunday matinees, following the opening of the fall season tonight. A special matinee

will be held at 5:30 every Sunday. In addition to last season's stellar cast, Antonio Triana, the world's most celebrated Spanish dancer, will be seen in this fall season's showing of the Mission Play.

"The Mission Play" depicts one of the most thrilling episodes in California history, the founding of the Missions, starting with the first settlement in San Diego in 1769. Intermingled with this adventurous romance of early California are fiestas, songs and dances of old Spain, Indian rituals, lending color and excitement to the stirring play by the late John Steven McGroarty, California historian and former poet laureate.

Handicapped Workers Prove Their Worth

A million and a half veterans and other Americans who want jobs are being denied their chance to help make America stronger because they are physically handicapped. The National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week committee of Los Angeles announced here today.

President Truman has proclaimed October 5-11 as National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week. Cooperating in promotion of the event in Los Angeles are: The Disabled American Veterans; California State Employment Service; U. S. Veterans Employment Service; California Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation; U. S. Veterans Administration; American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; Jewish War Veterans; A. F. of L.; C. I. O.; and Los Angeles Veterans Service Centers.

Pointing out the proven abilities of handicapped workers when properly placed in employment, H. E. Harms, Los Angeles Area Manager, California State Employment Service said: "In a recent survey conducted by the Department of Labor of 450 employers employing a total of 88,600 handicapped workers, it was revealed that 51% had no accident records than their non-impaired workers, 49% had better than average attendance records, and 88% stayed on the job longer. 45% of the handicapped workers referred to job by the California Employment Service are hired 60% of which are veterans. Properly placed handicapped workers can turn out equal or superior work. A physically handicapped person is not necessarily a handicapped worker."

Cheap Jeeps? No Such Animal, Reports WAA

It isn't exactly a crime to get names for "sucker lists," but the district attorney's office and other legal agencies have had their attention directed to characters who go around telling war veterans cheap jeeps are obtainable from the War Assets Administration, if the jeep fanciers will only give the character their names and addresses for his "sucker list."

More than 500 such names have been listed by solicitors in the Torrance district alone, WAA investigators reported. They added the information that there is no possibility of any veteran getting a jeep from WAA except through regular sales, duly advertised through legal channels, and announced publicly to all veterans. No such sale is now scheduled, however.

"Promises that anyone can get a jeep cheap are specious and absurd, in view of the prevailing prices at the last jeep sale at Maywood Sept. 8 and 9," one WAA official said.

"If any money changes hands as a result of such false pretenses, the matter will be a subject for criminal investigation."

"The rumor that purchasers who give their names to a spell binder with a notebook will get special consideration from WAA, in the same class with all other unfounded rumors."

Health Center Vaccinates

In order that the employees of the Torrance health district may be protected against influenza during the coming winter months, influenza vaccinations are being given to Los Angeles county health department personnel residing in Torrance, according to Dr. H. C. Smiley, district health officer.

The vaccine is similar to that given service men and women during the war and reports compiled from studies of the protective power of this vaccine indicate that it is effective for at least three to four months and in some cases a year or more.

Although the County health department has arranged for its own immunization for its own employees, it is not equipped to offer this service to others, Dr. Smiley said. However, he recommends that residents of the community seek this protection from their private physicians.

Congressional Group To Visit Torrance Area

A 16-member congressional public works committee will visit Torrance and Redondo Beach Saturday, October 11, as a part of a tour of the Los Angeles County shoreline. Chairman Raymond V. Darby of the Board of Supervisors disclosed.

Headed by Congressman Geo. A. Donervo of Michigan, the House delegation is scheduled to arrive in Redondo Beach at 11:45 a. m., after inspecting earlier in the day the site of the proposed Playa del Rey yacht harbor.

Darby declared the visiting Washington legislators are to conduct hearings in Los Angeles October 9 to 12 to determine the need for federal aid in beach erosion control, beach development for public bathing and construction of new federal buildings in the Los Angeles area, and flood-control projects.

The delegation will be entertained by the California Shoreline Planning Association and the City of Santa Monica at a banquet at the Miramar hotel in that city tomorrow, October 10.

Roy N. Clayton of Glendale, president of the California County Planning Commissioners Association, has selected a banquet chairman and toastmaster, according to Larson.

Two Californians are members of the committee. They are Congressman Gordon L. McDonough of Los Angeles and Alfred J. Elliott of the San Francisco bay region.

Licenses To Fish Needed

Everyone more than 16 years of age must have a valid fishing license to take any fish from any of the waters of this state, either fresh water streams or lakes, or from the waters of the ocean or bays. That is the gist of a new law, enacted during the 1947 session of the Legislature, and which became effective on Sept. 19, 1947.

Regardless of whether you fish for carp, or catfish, or suckers, or are after clams, crabs, mussels, bluefish, kelpbass, or cod, or are seeking trout, blackbass, salmon, tuna or what not—if you are fishing, and if you are 16 years of age or more, a fishing license is necessary.

Tattooing Of Dogs Asked

Tattooing of dogs might be used throughout Los Angeles County as a means of identifying them to their owners, according to Chairman Raymond V. Darby of the Board of Supervisors.

Captain H. Graham Konnar, chairman of National Dog week in Los Angeles, appeared before the Board at a recent meeting as an advocate of this method in returning lost, strayed or stolen dogs. Tattooing is both painless and permanent, he said.

Chairman Darby, who has suggested barring dogs from beaches in an effort to keep our shorelines clean, was impressed with the idea and said that it might be a good way to hold owners responsible for the misbehavior of their pets.

In line with the national proclamation of Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, Oct. 5-11, the Torrance office will place special emphasis upon obtaining employment for occupationally handicapped applicants. Employers having jobs that occupationally handicaps can do are urged to contact the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service.

There are a number of jobs available in the construction industry, such as cement finishers, tile setters, helpers and construction laborers. There is also a great need at the present time for machine pressers for laundry and dry cleaning establishments and for skilled and semi-skilled workers of all types.

Mrs. Ellis further stated that there are now available a few openings for on-the-job training for veterans. OJT openings, however, are not the only openings available for the veteran as there are many other jobs in which a veteran may start at the bottom and learn a trade with a good substantial company.

Employment opportunities for women remain in the clerical and service trades, with a number of openings available for stenographers, general office clerks, waitresses, fountain girls and housekeepers.
