New Enlistment Rules Given

Youths between the ages of 18 and 21 will no longer have to have consent of their parents to enlist in the Army Air Force, according to information received by M. Sgt. James R. Callison, army recruiting sergeant for the Torrance area.

Seventeen-year-old recruits still must have their parents' consent in duplicate and notarized, he added.

The method of proving age for the enlistees between 18 and 21 is by birth certificate, a signed statement from parent or guardian, signed statement from prominent local citizen, or signed statement from church official or member of local public institution.

Veterans' Disability Pensions Explained By J. G. Caldwell

Veterans who become totally disabled, and who have war service, even though the disability has no connection with war service, are entitled to minimum federal pensions of \$90 a month, according to James G. Caldwell, director of the Torrance Area Veterans Service center.

To qualify for this type of pension, the applicant must show that the disability is permanent and is not due to his own misconduct. The amount will be increased to \$72 after a veteran has received the pension for 10 years or has reached the age of 65.

The pension will be paid only if the veteran's income does not exceed \$1,000 a year, if single, or \$2,500 a year if married or having minor children. The veteran must have served at least 90 days, unless discharged for line-of-duty disability, and must have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Pensions also are provided for widows and children of World War I veterans in non-service connected cases, Caldwell explained. A World War II widow is entitled to a pension only if the veteran had a service connected disability of at least 10 per cent at the time of his death, although death need not have been the result of his war service.

Full information regarding pension matters and assistance in filing claims is available without charge to all veterans and dependents of veterans at the Torrance Area Veterans Service center, 1339 Post ave.

Jr. Colleges Get Vets Aid

El Camino College and other California Junior Colleges were assured Friday by the Veterans Administration that they are entitled to reimbursement for supplies and equipment issued to student veterans.

The announcement that several months of differences caused by a conflict between California school laws and a Veterans Administration regulation had been settled came from Roy E. Simpson, superintendent of public education.

Books were not involved, but veterans were faced with the possibility of bearing costs of such items as art supplies and mechanical drawing sets. In many cases the junior colleges had advanced the equipment to the students and depended upon eventual payment from the Veterans Administration.

Simpson said the decision is "an agreement that amicably settles a question of genuine concern to student veterans" as the cost burden of the junior colleges would have otherwise been prohibitive.

MODERN UNION OIL SERVICE STATION OPENS ON FIGUEROA



COUNTY ADOPTS TRUMAN'S PROGRAM FOR SAVING FOOD

President Truman's food-saving program has been endorsed by the County Board of Supervisors with an addendum instructing all county-operated institutions to comply rigidly with the new food program.

Calling for county-wide enforcement of the program as laid down by the President and other national leaders, they asked for meatless Tuesdays and no poultry and eggs on Thursday.

Increased Wages, Too

On top of these "rules" changes, the leaders of the operating unions have filed an additional demand for a wage increase of over 30 per cent. If granted, this would be an added cost to the railroads of \$400,000,000 a year.

\$468,000,000 To Non-Operating Employees

In addition to this, an Arbitration Board has just granted a wage increase of 15 1/2 cents an hour to the million employees represented by the 17 non-operating unions. This will cost the railroads \$468,000,000 a year.

Where Will The Money Come From?

Where will all the money come from to pay these increases? They total several times as much as the railroads made in 1946 or will make in 1947.

In July, the railroads filed an application for increased freight rates to close the gap which then existed between wage and material costs, and railroad revenues. Since then it has been necessary, because of further increases in wages and material costs, to supplement that petition and to ask for an additional freight rate

increase. No other course is open. Railroads Do Not Run For Employees Alone

Railroads are operated for the benefit of not one, but several groups—shippers, passengers, employes, stockholders, and the general public. The interest of all must be served—and that cannot be done unless the railroads can operate efficiently and economically, and unless they are allowed to earn sufficient revenue to provide the kind of transportation service this country MUST HAVE.
