
Performances will be given nightly except Sundays; matinees, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

If anyone in California wants 7,000 bread pans, he can come straight to Torrancia.

Stacked up for inspection in the Naval storehouse there are 6,130 black, steel four-section pans, 21 inches long, and 686 three-section pans, 17 inches long. Pans are to be sold by the WAA on sealed bid to be opened Oct. 27.

**New Climate Claims Made**

**Floral Tribute To Naval Dead**

In fitting tribute to the thousands of Americans who lost their lives at sea, a dockside memorial service will be held at the U. S. Naval Base, Terminal island, at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 26.

Thousands of flower blossoms from friends and relatives of these honored dead will be placed on the deck of a submarine. As a climax to the ceremony, the submarine will then proceed out to sea. When an appropriate distance from land, the submarine will submerge, leaving the blossoms scattered on the waves.

Those wishing to contribute flowers for this ceremony are asked to send single blooms addressed to the senior Naval chaplain, U. S. Naval Base, Terminal island, to arrive not later than midnight Saturday, Oct. 25.

**You Don't Have To Be Engineer To Join 578th**

You don't have to be an "engineer" to be a member of the 578th Combat Engineers Battalion, California National Guard.

In fact, if you are a clerk, typist, stenographer, photographer, electrician, radio operator, cook, painter, welder, automobile mechanic, water tender, blacksmith, motor vehicle and heavy equipment operator or a tool superintendent, you can enlist and get ratings ranging from corporal to master sergeant. Construction foremen, draftsmen and others of the engineering field, also are needed.

Pay for one training period a week is allowed, based on regular army compensation according to grade.

World War II veterans are being taken into the 578th in the grade held before their discharge.

The unit's training period is Tuesday from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

**Ask New Card Room Measure In Los Angeles**

Police power to regulate social card clubs has been asked by Sheriff Eugene W. Biscailuz. The Sheriff wants the Board of Supervisors to adopt an ordinance similar to one passed by the City of Los Angeles under which police close all such clubs at midnight.

Biscailuz contends these establishments are a "police problem." The Sheriff's proposal was backed by Supervisor William A. Smith.

"I think such clubs should be eliminated entirely. They are merely 'fronts' for organized gambling rings," he commented.

According to Biscailuz, there is a concerted move to open more card clubs in unincorporated county territory and wants them licensed as a means of supervising their activities.

Mayor Fletcher Bowron has signed an emergency ordinance which fixes Los Angeles hotel and rooming house rents as they were under Federal O.P.A. plus an additional 25 per cent.

The new law will remain in effect until March 1, 1948. It reestablishes rent controls.

The mayor was informed by the City Council today that under the provisions of the ordinance the Appeal Board for hotel operators will be the City Council, which upon receipt of appeals from the fixed rates, will designate the committee on public health and welfare to hold hearings and make investigations.
