El Camino Title Hopes Disappear With 6-0 Loss

 Amby Schindler's El Camino Warriors lost their chance to win a championship in their first year out when they dropped a 6-0 verdict to East L.A. Saturday at Centinela field, Inglewood.

The play seasawed between the two teams for the first three periods. After four minutes of the closing stanza, the visiting Huskies picked up their score that won the game. Howard Decker hit over his left guard from one foot out to break the deadlock and climax a 62-yard march which included passes of 22 and 23 yards.

Following the touchdown, Warriors Jerry Witt and Dick Contreras teamed up on a pass down on the East L.A. 14, the El Camino passing attack failed with the Huskies taking over on downs and freezing the ball for the rest of the game.

Camino halfback Phil Daher sparkled offensively and defensively for the locals, but despite the Warriors' being in East L.A. territory throughout the game, costly fumbles and pass interceptions kept them from penetrating beyond the 14.

This Saturday, the Warriors take on San Diego Navy in a Community Chest game at Redondo Seahawk bowl. This will be their final appearance at the bowl. Approximately \$3,000 is expected to be given to the South Bay fund with a large turnout anticipated.

Beverly Hills Beats Torrance By 20-14 Count

The Torrance Tartars dropped their fourth Bay League contest Friday night at Redondo Seahawk bowl as the Beverly Hills

Normans took to the air to defeat them, 20-14.

Surging back after being outplayed in the first half, the Tartars got their first score in the third period as Bill Morgan intercepted a Beverly pass and sped 70 yards down the sidelines to score.

The second Torrance score came on a 64-yard march in five plays with Jack Taylor taking a flanker pass from Dick Turner on the 10 and going over for the TD. Center Eddie Fortin kicked both conversions.

The Normans scoring started drove from their own 42 in nine plays to score the first time they got their hands on the ball. Fullback Weisstein hit the line for the two-yard marker for the TD and then ran for the conversion.

The Hillsman tallied again late in the second quarter on a 30-yard pass from Brame to Storum. Two penalties moved the try for point after touchdown from the two back to the 12 from which point the visitors failed.

The last Beverly touchdown started on the mid-field stripe after the Tartars gambled on a fourth down with less than a yard to go and didn't make it. Ten plays later, Weisstein went over from two yards out, with Renner running for the extra point.

Bill Morgan sparkled on offense for the Tartars, rolling up 99 yards on 13 tries for an average of 7.6 yards per carry. This figure doesn't include his 70-yard dash with the intercepted pass after plucking the ball from the hands of the Beverly receiver.

After kicking too short twice and having only one more chance, Bob Turner took over and booted the ball to the 37, where a Beverly player fell on it. The Normans then succeeded in freezing the ball until the game ended.

This week, Torrance meets winless Leuzinger at Leuzinger field in Lawndale. The game had originally been scheduled for the Redondo bowl but was shifted to make way for the Community Chest game between El Camino and San Diego Navy.
