


\$1,500,000 Plant Ahead Of Schedule

ORDINANCE No. 397 OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING A LICENSE TAX FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF SELLING TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY BY RETAIL PROVIDING FOR THE PROTECTING AND PAYING OF SUCH TAX AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE PROVISIONS HEREOF.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: SECTION I. Imposition and Rate of Tax. For the privilege of selling tangible personal property at retail tax hereby imposed upon all retailers at the rate of one-half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) of the gross receipts of any retailer from the sale of all tangible personal property sold at retail in the City of Torrance on or after December 1, 1947. The license tax imposed by the provisions of this ordinance is in addition to any other taxes imposed by any other ordinance of the City of Torrance.

SECTION II. Tax levied in Same Manner as State Tax. The tax hereby levied, except otherwise herein provided, is levied in the same manner, to the same extent and under the same conditions, though taxes are levied pursuant to Part I of the State Tax and Revenue Code, known as the Sales and Use Tax Law, as applied and in force on or after December 1, 1947.

SECTION III. Adoption of State Sales and Use Tax Law. Except the provisions of the provisions of the ordinance amended and in force and effect on October 1946, except the provisions thereof relating to the "Use Tax" and Sections 6061, 6062, 6063, 6064, 6065, 6066, 6067, 6071, 6451, 7052, 7056, 7101, 7102, 7103, 7151, 7152, 7153, applicable to sales of property at retail, are hereby adopted and applied to this ordinance and the tax here imposed and are applicable to this ordinance and the tax here imposed in all respects as if the term "gross receipts" as used herein, does not include the amount of sales tax levied by the State of California upon or with respect to retail sales of property to the retailer or upon the consumer.

SECTION IV. Revocation of Permits. The City Clerk shall, upon the receipt of a written notice from the person to whom the permit was issued, revoke the permit if the person fails to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance and the regulations adopted pursuant hereto. SECTION V. Same. The inclusion of any clause, portion or part of the State Tax and Revenue Code, known as the Sales and Use Tax Law, hereby adopted, providing for the equalization of the State of California, in the part of the State Board of Equalization, shall be performed by the City Clerk.

SECTION VI. Adoption of Rules and Regulations by Reference. The City of Torrance shall be deemed to have adopted and enforced the "Sales and Use Tax Law," insofar as applicable, shall apply in the interpretation of this ordinance until specifically amended by this ordinance.

SECTION VII. Same. The inclusion of any clause, portion or part of the State Tax and Revenue Code, known as the Sales and Use Tax Law, hereby adopted, providing for the equalization of the State of California, in the part of the State Board of Equalization, shall be performed by the City Clerk.

SECTION VIII. Divulging of Information Forbidden. It is unlawful for any officer or employee of the City of Torrance having an administrative duty under this ordinance to make known in any manner whatsoever the business affairs, operations, or information obtained by an investigation of records and equipment of any retailer or any other person visited or examined in the discharge of official duty, or the amount or source of income, profits, losses, expenditures, or any particular thereof set forth or disclosed in any return, or to permit any return or copy thereof or any book containing any abstract or particulars thereof to be seen or examined by any person. However, the City Council may, by resolution, authorize examination of the returns by Federal or State officers or employees or by the tax officers of this or any other city if a reciprocal arrangement exists. Successors, receivers, trustees, executors, administrators, assignees or guarantors, if directly interested, may be given information as to the items included in the measure and amounts of tax required to be col-

deemed to exclude any of the remaining provisions of said "Sales and Use Tax Law" that are made a part hereof by reference only.

SECTION IX. Unlawful Advertisements. It is unlawful for any retailer to advertise or hold out or state to the public or to any customer, directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or that it will not be added to the selling price of the property sold or that, if the retailer or any part thereof will be refunded. Any person violating any provision of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION X. Same. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the terms of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for a period of not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION XI. Unlawful Advertisements. It is unlawful for any retailer to advertise or hold out or state to the public or to any customer, directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or that it will not be added to the selling price of the property sold or that, if the retailer or any part thereof will be refunded. Any person violating any provision of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XII. Due Date. The taxes imposed by this ordinance are due and payable to the City Clerk on or before the first day of the month, succeeding each quarterly period, the first quarterly period commencing on the last day of April, 1948, and thereafter, on the last day of the month of December, 1947, together with the tax imposed by Torrance City Ordinance No. 378, covering the months of October and November, 1947, on or before the last day of January, 1948.

SECTION XIII. Reimbursement. The tax hereby imposed shall be called by the retailer from the consumer insofar as it can be done.

SECTION XIV. Unlawful Advertisements. It is unlawful for any retailer to advertise or hold out or state to the public or to any customer, directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or that it will not be added to the selling price of the property sold or that, if the retailer or any part thereof will be refunded. Any person violating any provision of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION XV. Suit for Tax. All taxes hereby levied shall be payable to the City Clerk and any civil suit for the collection thereof may be filed in any court of competent jurisdiction in the State of California, and the City Attorney of said city shall prosecute the action.

SECTION XVI. Disposition of Proceeds. All monies collected under and pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be deposited and paid into the General Fund of the City of Torrance.

SECTION XIX. Penalties. Any person required to make any return, sign, or verify any report under the provisions of this ordinance, who makes any false or fraudulent return, with intent to defeat or evade the determination of any effective tax, and who is not otherwise punishable by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for a period of not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION XX. Same. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the terms of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for a period of not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION XXI. Unlawful Advertisements. It is unlawful for any retailer to advertise or hold out or state to the public or to any customer, directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or that it will not be added to the selling price of the property sold or that, if the retailer or any part thereof will be refunded. SECTION XXII. Renewal of Permit. A seller whose permit has been previously issued and renewed shall pay the City Clerk a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for the renewal of a permit.

It is unlawful for any retailer to advertise or hold out or state to the public or to any customer, directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or that it will not be added to the selling price of the property sold or that, if the retailer or any part thereof will be refunded. Mrs. Drake wore a serape, also a reboso, (a scarf around the head.) The reboso had many beautiful designs woven into its fabric.

When Mrs. Drake came to California in the late '70's, she told the pupils, sheep, goats, horses and cattle ranged the hills and valleys. "Los Angeles county was divided into large cattle ranchos," she said. The Indians used plaited leather lassos. Their two-wheel carts were put together with wooden pegs and tied with leather straps. Instead of horses, oxen were used to pull their carts.

"The Indian wove lovely baskets for household use. They did not have pots and pans to cook with, but instead they made and used pottery in large and small sizes. The pottery had beautiful designs in color made from the dye obtained from roots, burrs and insects."

Thanksgiving Overeating Brings Warning

Although menus have been simplified somewhat since the olden days when tables groaned under the food placed upon them, Thanksgiving is traditionally a day when more food in greater variety is prepared and when those who sit down to such a dinner consume more than needed.

With many people generally eating lighter than formerly due partly to sedentary work and partly to a patriotic desire to conserve food, it is no wonder that following a holiday dinner, the participants rather than the tables do the groaning. Most homes have adequate storage so that leftovers can be kept safe for another meal and there is no need to stuff oneself on the first meal.

Eating slowly results in appreciation of the holiday fare far more than bolting it and also assists materially in digestion. Undigested food furnishes no fuel for the body.

Sensible housewives, if preparing a heavy main course, will dispense with the pies and puddings and substitute a light dessert such as fresh or canned fruit. Fruit salad makes an excellent topping for the dinner and is not crowded in with the main menu.

In all instances a wary inner-serve should be kept on the intake so that the dessert, when served, is not an added burden on the system's capacity. The old saw, "The best reducing exercise is to push oneself away from the table," is especially good on feast days.


