Tips Given On Planting For Home Orchards

In making plans for the home orchard, first find out what kinds of fruit will grow best in your neighborhood. There are big differences even in Los Angeles county south of the San Gabriel mountains.

Near the coast, apples, pears and peaches do not yield well. In fact, most of them are failures.

Fifteen or twenty miles inland the story is quite different. Some of those that fail near the ocean do fairly well if planted on low cold ground. A mile or two away up on a hillside temperatures may be too warm. These hillside may be better adapted to citrus or avocados than they are to peaches, or pears, or apples. So look around and see what your neighbors have and decide what will do best in your area.

Then comes the matter of varieties. Nearly all deciduous fruit trees must have a certain amount of cold weather in the winter time. Some require more than others. If it isn't cold enough, the poor things don't know when to wake up and begin growing in the spring. You have seen peach trees with small, weak, partly opened blossoms, some of which may set fruit in April or May. At that time there are no leaves in sight. Sometimes the fruit will be as big as a golf ball before the leaves come out. A tree like that didn't have enough cold during the preceding winter. It can't grow good fruit. Most of the varieties we know best, like Winesap, Rome Beauty and Macintosh apples, like J. H. Hale, Elberta, Sim's Cling peaches, don't like our climate at all. They like the kind of winter that citrus and avocado growers hate to see with temperatures below freezing many nights. So don't just go to your nursery and buy a peach tree because the nurseryman has it for sale. Find out the kind you should plant and try and get it. Vitamins Lost In Modified Forms Of Milk

With rising food prices, milk has increased in cost proportionately less than many other foods. In attempting to stretch the food budget, it is best not to eliminate milk from the diet since it still offers the best food value on the market today.

Provided they meet the standards set by governmental regulations, the less expensive forms of milk, such as buttermilk, skimmed milk, evaporated and powdered milk, are satisfactory beverage-foods for the daily diet. However, there is some loss of vitamins in the modifications. Buttermilk and skimmed milk are convenient and economical forms of milk, but vitamin A, which has been removed with the cream, should be replaced by the addition of other foods. For example, an ounce of butter will furnish the lacking vitamin, although at the current price it would be cheaper to buy whole milk.

A chocolate milk preparation (basis—skimmed milk), offered many times as an inducement to children, is also short on vitamin A; therefore, it is better, even though more expensive, to make it at home with whole milk and a minimum of chocolate syrup.

Some vitamin D milks cost more, but a substitution at home of a few drops of a soluble vitamin D preparation in whole milk will give more vitamin D at less cost.

Evaporated milk plus sugar is less expensive to use in coffee than condensed milk. A tall can of the latter contains nearly half a pound of sugar, but the sugar is cheaper if purchased separately than in condensed milk.

Whatever the cost of milk, it should be included in every food budget for every member of the family.

COLORADO

The state of Colorado boasts about 6 million acres of farm lands. It boasts of 35 minerals, of which gold and silver lead; it is the chief beet sugar producing state and has over sixteen beet sugar refineries; on account of its fine summer climate, its tourist trade is very large; its largest city, Denver, is the trade center for the Rocky Mountain states.

Distribution Of Returned War Dead Explained

As the return of World War II dead for final burial in this country will begin this month, Col. T. H. Ramsey, commanding officer of the Mira Loma Quartermaster depot, the distribution center for the program in this area, feels that information should be furnished in regard to the operational time lapse that can be expected between the arrival of the deceased military personnel at the ports of New York and San Francisco and the final delivery of remains to next of kin.

This lapse of time may be as great as three weeks, though probably averaging out somewhat less than that. Factors which will influence this situation include the distance of residence of next of kin from the port of arrival, and the number of rail transfer points and connections to be made between the port, the Mira Loma Quartermaster depot, and the final destination. This is particularly true of the Arizona and New Mexico destinations.

In the immediate vicinity of the Mira Loma depot, deliveries will be made by service car, which will facilitate delivery upon arrival at the distribution center.

Col. Ramsey emphasizes the fact that the next of kin will receive positive information, by means of two telegrams from the distribution center, regarding the final delivery of the remains home. The first of these telegrams will be dispatched from Mira Loma at the time the remains arrive at the port of entry, and the other just prior to the time the deceased will be shipped from the depot.

In further explanation, the first telegram is a request for confirmation of information regarding consignee that was submitted by next of kin on the original questionnaire. Col. Ramsey states that promptness of response to this first confirmation will have some bearing on the above mentioned lapse of time. The second telegram will advise as to the actual date of arrival home of the deceased.
