855 Seeking Employment in Torrance Area

Eight hundred and fifty-five residents of the Torrance-Lomita area make up a large labor pool available through the Torrance office, California State Employment Service, according to Manager Winona Ellis.

Five hundred and thirty-one men, of whom 50 per cent are veterans, and 324 women, are seeking work through the office.

Managerial, clerical, and sales workers number 245; and include teachers, office and sales managers, engineers, musicians, photographers, stenographers, typists, sales clerks, general office clerks, bookkeepers, receptionists, and P.B.X. operators. In the service trades 122 persons are listed as elevator operators, household workers, rough and finish carpenters, electricians, cement finishers, riggers, marine, bench and shop machinists, janitors, waitresses, cooks, bus boys, and dishwashers.

Also seeking employment are 191 skilled workers in many fields including: acetylene and combination welders, bakers, rough and finish carpenters, electricians, cement finishers, riggers, marine, bench and shop machinists, and fitters.

Semi-skilled workers, 154 men and women, are available for jobs as truck drivers, sub-assembly, service station attendants, power sewing machine operators, engine lathe operators, drill press operators, milling machine operators, and various other shop and construction trades.

There are 147 unskilled workers in the labor pool who are experienced in simple and routine jobs.

Construction Funds Still On Hand, Report

Los Angeles county has a balance of \$9,440,908 out of the \$12,020,111 allotted to it from the state's \$45,000,000 aid to counties for construction and employment purposes, California Taxpayers association reported today. Data are for Oct. 31, 1947.

Applications filed by the county to Oct. 31 total \$1,637,623, of which \$541,109 is for highways and bridges, \$787,785 for hospitals and sanitariums, and \$1,132,069 for other purposes, including detention homes, veterans memorials, sewers and fire protection purposes.

Transfers and assignments to cities, school districts or other districts in the county total \$941,880.

Statewide, the fifty-eight counties on Oct. 31, 1947 had a total unapplied balance of \$33,113,266 out of the \$45,000,000 appropriated, the association said. County applications filed total \$9,550,630, with \$6,895,060 for highways, \$1,452,501 for hospitals and sanitariums, and \$1,203,069 for other purposes, including detention homes, veterans memorials, sewers and fire protection purposes.
