What does a little five-year-old girl love? A spider named Lillian, a dead snake named Fluffy, and "a clam good enough to sleep with" named Judith.

At least these are the loves of Nana, daughter of the John Shidlers, and they have resulted in her being made the subject of an article written with sympathetic understanding of a child's world by Shirley Gordon in the January issue of The Woman and entitled "Farewell, Dear Fluffy." Nana's father is the Judge Shidler of Gardena township. Her mother, Rosemary De Camp, plays the part of Judy, the nurse in the "Dr. Christian" radio program.

Nana, too, has a world of her own. Through her walks with Nana, the author explains, she sees the world as the "true fairyland that it is." For Nana has a love for all animals and treats each with "thoughtful regard."

In describing Nana's discovery of Fluffy, her dead snake, her introduction of him into the family circle, and her reluctant burial of him, the author presents an insight into the strange forms of affection with which children so often astonish their parents.

It was the new friend Nana found while hiking along the ocean's edge. "We enjoyed its companionship for a few days," the author concludes, "She slept with it and named it Judith."

Atomic Rocks on Exhibition at Museum

An interesting display of minerals and rocks from which ornaments, metals and tools were developed by man from the time of the dim and misty past down to the present day atomic period, are now on view to the public in the rotunda of the Los Angeles County Museum in Exposition Park.

The exhibit, which depicts the development and progress made in the stone, bronze, iron, light metals and atomic ages, is running concurrent with the German masterpieces art show at the museum to Jan. 22.




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
