People generally, especially those in Torrance, behaved better in 1948 than they did in 1947. At least this seems to be indicated in a report on police activities compiled by Lucille Stroh, police clerk.

Discussion on Public School Support Heard

Problems of professional improvement and future development of public school support were studied by nearly 100 teachers representing the local education associations of Torrance and 11 neighboring communities here last Saturday.

Officers and state leaders of the California Teachers Association served as consultants and discussion leaders for the area conference. The meeting at Torrance High School was the fifteenth of twenty-five such conferences being held by teachers throughout California.

In afternoon sessions, groups discussed methods of better interpreting the school program to the public, current legislation to the public, affecting education, and methods of raising professional standards among teachers. Representatives from education associations of Enterprise, South Bay, Compton City, Compton Secondary, Lynwood, Paramount, El Segundo, Inglewood, Hawthorne, Santa Monica, City College and Lawndale joined the Torrance Education Association in these discussions.

Following the professional meetings, the representatives enjoyed dinner and social gathering at the First Christian church.

School Dance Classes Win Legal Okay

A local school district has the authority to permit the conduct of dancing classes on school property for which a charge to pupils is made, but it would be safer from a legal standpoint if no charge was made.

This is the opinion of Harold W. Kennedy, county counsel, in reply to N. D. Meyers, superintendent of Palos Verdes School district, who sought advice on the matter.

According to Myers, the school plans to hold eight dancing classes sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association, charging each pupil \$10 for instruction, most of which would go to the teacher.

Withholding Figures Due

The deadline for employers to furnish their employees with Form W-2, the withholding statement which indicates the amount of salary paid and the amount withheld to apply on federal tax liability, is Jan. 31.

The Collector of Internal Revenue suggests that if they are provided as early as possible, it will speed up the receipt of refunds to tax payers whose withholdings have exceeded their tax liability.

Superior Court Enlargement Is Considered

An additional courtroom for the Inglewood branch of the Superior Court, which serves the Torrance-Southwest section of the county, was being considered this week by county officials. Recommendation for a second, but smaller, courtroom was made by Superior Judge Phillip H. Richards who has presided over the court for the last year.

Estimated cost of the addition is \$2500, which would enable the Inglewood Justice court and the Superior court branch to have separate quarters. County architects are considering the proposal, according to Supervisor Ray V. Darby of this district.

Judge Richards said that during 1948 the number of Superior Court filings in Inglewood, during its first year of existence, totaled 896. By a coincidence, Darby said, that is the exact number of filings for 1948 in the San Fernando branch court, over which Judge Richards presides on a part-time basis.

Of those crimes called to the attention of local police there was one murder in '47 whereas in '48 there was none. There were 13 robberies two years ago compared with only two in 1948. In 1947 police had reports of 41 burglaries where last year only 19 were reported.

In 1947 police arrested 404 persons for being in their cups while last year only 277 persons who sipped heavily of the little brown jug were juggled.

People's manners were rather general in their improvement except for courtesy on the highway. Here is what happened in 1947 and 1948:

Faith in fellow man apparently increased during 1948. Police reported finding 222 doors and windows left open as compared to 121 in 1947.

Each officer rode in patrol cars equal to making two and a half round trips to New York to bring the total distance covered in 1948 to 150,636 miles. In 1947 patrol cars covered 110,343 miles.

State Reports Farm Labor Adequate

The Department of Employment reports that there is adequate farm labor in all areas of the state, with labor surpluses developing in some parts of the state. The continued cold wave has been the principal cause for the loss of employment by many agricultural workers.

In Southern California, the Department reports there has been extensive damage to the citrus and vegetable crops. It is too early to estimate the extent of this loss, but in Imperial Valley the entire tomato and pea crops have been destroyed.

Because of the labor surpluses, Hayes urges all farm workers to check with the nearest Department of Employment offices for current information concerning agricultural jobs. Job opportunities are very limited and workers are advised not to make any move unless they have jobs at their destination.

Petroleum Experts to Hold Session

Petroleum and mining engineers from the western states soon will convene on San Francisco for the annual meeting of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers, Feb. 13 to 17.

Although hundreds of delegates will attend from eastern states, the meeting is looked upon as a western show. It will be the first time in the Institute's 78-year history that one of its annual meetings has been held on the Pacific Coast.

Sessions on petroleum production will be among the highlights. Also planned are a symposium on phosphate mining, as well as discussions of coal production and its relation to the economy of the Pacific Coast and mountain states. There will be several discussions of atomic mineral deposits in the United States and Canada.

Government Will Compute Income Tax

Wage earners whose salary is subject to withholding for federal income tax purposes may file their withholding statements with the Collector of Internal Revenue this year, and have him compute their tax, and then send them a bill or a refund.

A simple blank, known as Form 1040-A, has been prepared for the same purpose, and is the only form that will be acceptable. If either a taxpayer uses the new Form 1040-A, or the Form 1040, the Withholding Statements which he has received from employers during the year 1948 must be attached to the return.
