



BRILLIANT BLOOMS . . . California's First International Flower Show opens Saturday, March 26, in the mammoth club house at Hollywood Park, Inglewood. During its nine days, the flower show will feature five special days, including: Amateur Photographers Day, Pan American Day, Garden Clubs Day, Hawaiian Day, and Centennials Day. More than three acres of exhibits from far and wide, including huge garden cut flowers, flower arrangements, and decorations, will feature the new annual show, planned to rival any in the world.

CALIFORNIA'S FLOWER SHOW OPENS SATURDAY

At 1 o'clock Saturday, March 26, the doors of Hollywood Park's beautiful clubhouse in Inglewood will swing open for the largest flower display ever held in the West, the first annual California International Flower Show. A 9-day event planned to spread California's fame as the nation's flower basket, it will be open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily through Sunday, April 3.

So many exhibitors will show whole gardens of orchids that officials expect the finest display of these expensive blooms ever shown. Color and perfume of azaleas and rhododendrons, dozens of camellia plants from professional and amateur growers, giant gladioli and cypripediums flown from Australia, a unique California wildflower exhibit, and other rare and fine blooms from several states and foreign countries will charm the visitor.

Special events are planned throughout the show for varied interest. Models will pose in floral settings on Monday for Amateur Photographers Day. Pan American consuls and countries will be honored Tuesday. On Wednesday, Garden Club Day, experts will talk on flower growing, arranging, corsage

making, and other homemakers topics. Hawaii's exotic blooms will be featured Thursday, and Friday, Centennial Day, honor will be paid California's centennial, and all golden wedding couples of 1949 will be admitted free, with a huge cake to be cut in their honor.

Flower growers report that favorable March weather has insured the finest blooms in years for the show.

Consolidation of Primaries Held Likely

The consolidation of the May and August primary elections, conducted separately prior to the war, and then combined as an emergency measure, is likely to be permanent, stated Ben S. Hite, county registrar of voters, who returned this week from a week at Sacramento in attendance at the annual legislative convention of the county clerk's association.

The elimination of the May presidential primary was confirmed by the elections committee of the assembly in turning down a bill to have it restored to the election code. Hite said, and he pointed out that the savings in Los Angeles County would approximate 2 1/2 million dollars each presidential year.

The committee also turned down a proposal to push the present August primary over to the month of September, he said.

Hite reported that the committee had taken favorable action on A.B. 1293, a measure sponsored by the county clerk's association, to eliminate the publication of the names of the election officers, now published in newspapers twice preceding each general election.

The registrar stated that re-apportionment measures for re-locating new assembly and congressional district lines would not be taken up by the legislature until its session in 1951, following completion of the Federal census in 1950.

Films on Babies for Expectant Mothers Offered

"Life With Baby," the March of Time film made for the Yale clinic, will be shown at the expectant mothers' class in the Torrance health center, 2300 Carson street, Torrance, March 29 at 1:30 o'clock, according to Mrs. Eileen Pullen, public health nurse-instructor.

State Income Tax Liability Explained

Charles J. McColgan, Franchise Tax Commissioner today warned new residents of California of their possible liability to file returns under the California Personal Income Tax Law.

Individuals who are in California for other than temporary or transitory purposes are considered to be residents of this State and are required to file a return if their net income for any year subsequent to 1944 equals or exceeds their personal exemption, \$3000 if single and \$4500 if married or head of a family.
