**Rent Control Under Study**

County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy is studying the Federal Rent Control Law to see if the Board of Supervisors has authority under that statute to decontrol rents in unincorporated territory.  
Supervisors instructed Kennedy to bring in a report on the matter following a statement by board chairman William A. Smith that vacancies in the number of apartments and housing units are rising throughout the county.  
Supervisors wanted advice from Kennedy on the procedures to be taken by them for rent decontrol should it be found that such authority was given by the Congress in its act governing rents.

**Radio Programs for Classroom Listening Resumed This Year**

Daily radio programs for classroom listening will be broadcast again by the Los Angeles City Schools over KFAC. These popular programs which were heard by school children last year and proved of special interest to youngsters who were out of school because of illness, will be broadcast at 1:15 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. Monday through Fridays.

The programs, which cover literature, music and science, will be prepared under the supervision of Mr. Ralph Demmon, Supervisor of the Radio Office, Audio-Visual Aids Section, Curriculum Division. Study guides for each program are being prepared in his office and will be sent to the schools for use of teachers in making the programs vital for pupils.

On Monday, the program will be "Books Bring Adventure"... a series of transcribed dramatizations from books which have proved popular with listeners in the upper elementary and lower junior high grades. The programs are made by Gloria Chandler Recordings, Inc., in New York.

Tuesday and Friday there will be "Making Friends with Music," a music appreciation program for upper elementary and junior high school children. William C. Hartshorn, Music Supervisor of the City Schools, will prepare the outline and do the narration, and the program will be produced in the studio of the Curriculum office.

Each Wednesday will bring the program "Adventures in Research," a new series in Science for ninth grade junior high school students, which in some cases may be suitable for seventh and eighth grades. These transcriptions were produced by the Westinghouse Research Laboratories, and each one will tell the story of a man or woman who has made an outstanding contribution to scientific advancement.

Thursday's program will be "Once Upon a Time," a popular story-telling series designed for lower elementary listeners. It will be produced in the Curriculum studios, with Betty Leigh Van Werden doing the narration.

In the offing is a series on United Nations, World Friendship and related subject matter, to start in February, 1950. This series which will be broadcast weekly, is being prepared by Mrs. Nelva Benson, former Los Angeles elementary principal, with the help and cooperation of Dr. Walter Kingson of U.C.L.A. It is an attempt to bring the idea of the United Nations and what it means into the actual experience level and comprehension of the school child in a dramatic way.

**Fly Fighters**

**Seek to Retire All 'Unfit' Garbage Cans**

Members of the Fly Abatement Committee of Torrance raised their legal swatters this week to deliver still another blow to the city's fly menace.

Garbage cans which are found to be contributing to the fly nuisance and thereby are in violation of the County Health and Safety code will be tagged as "unfit."

Plan of tagging cans which are leaky, without fly-tight covers, and in other ways encouraging the breeding of flies follows a plan which has been in operation in Los Angeles City for some time.

"This plan," commented Jack O. Baldwin, chairman of F.A.C.T., "is step number three which must be taken if the city is to benefit by any fly control campaign."

George Stevens, the city manager, reported that two previous steps have already been completed or are still under way. Alleys throughout the city have been cleaned and sprayed with "Lindane," newest of the fly-killing chemicals. Last week Boy Scouts in the area distributed some 5000 circulars to homes in the city. The leaflets urged the cooperation of homeowners and pointed out ways to bring about effective fly control around the home.

Many dairies in the area have been ordered to take more precautions to guard against the spread of disease by the germ-carrying fly.




