COLLEGE OFFERS COMMERCIAL ART COMPLETE COURSE



JUDGE URGES MARITAL 'COOLING OFF' PERIOD

"These wives," protests City Judge Otto B. Willett, "who are quick to call 'Cops' against their husbands should be forced to wait through a 24-hour-cooling off period before signing a complaint."

The local court judge, himself a husband and father, made the counter-complaint last Thursday after a wife refused to prosecute her husband for whom she had earlier sworn out a complaint for wife-beating.

"The courts," opined the magistrate, "are to mete out justice and punish the guilty. They are not to be used to settle family squabbles. This is a court of law—not a court of marital relations."

The jurist told newsmen: "Oh, this isn't the first time this has happened. Roused out of bed at five in the morning by some irate wife who swears by all that's holy that she is going to send her husband to jail for beating her up. Comes trial time however, and 'All is forgiven!'"

"This court intends to punish those brought before it who are found to be guilty of breaking the law, but it will not allow itself to be used as a weapon by wives as a 'threat' to keep their husbands in line—especially so when the wife provokes the fight."

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College Enrollment Still Rising

Enrollment at El Camino College reached a record high Friday night with 2710 students signed up for day and evening classes. Late enrollments are expected to bring the total to more than 3,000, according to H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel. Peak enrollment last year was 2,469.

In order to provide for the increased number of students, 17 new instructors have been added to the regular staff and several part-time teachers have been engaged to teach special classes. The College operates on an extended day from 8 a.m. to 10 p. m. Enrollment will continue in all classes through September 30.

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
