Volunteers in the Advance G-its and the two Commerce and Industry units of the Torrance Community Chest campaign received their supplies and final "briefing" at the "A-Plus Day" meeting held Tuesday morning at the Chamber of Commerce, according to Dean L. Sears and Sam Levy, campaign chairman.

The "A-Plus Day" meeting marked the start of the first phase of the Torrance campaign to raise a goal of \$17,000 which is a 17 percent increase over the total raised here last year, Levy said.

A feature of the meeting was the first showing of the new Community Chest film, "It's Up to Us" by Leo Wagner, volunteer projectionist for the Torrance and Gardena area.

County Orders Closer Check on Smog Violators

A closer check is to be kept on person or firms accused of violating the smog ordinance and the outcome of their cases, board of supervisors ruled Tuesday.

The board adopted a motion by Supervisor John Anson Ford requiring Smog Control Chief Gordon P. Larson to submit regular reports on citations issued against industrial plants and asking the hearing board to give supervisors direct information on the disposition of the actions.

Also the board asked for a written summary of all cases prosecuted to date.
