Permits Needed For Buildings Emitting Smog

Under regulations adopted by the Board of Supervisors for the County Air Pollution Control District, permits will have to be obtained after next Feb. 1 before building, altering or replacing equipment issuing air contaminants.

Political subdivisions are exempted from the rule, and a permit is not required for such construction, replacement or alteration costing less than \$300.

Appeals from the air pollution control officer's decision may be made in writing within 30 days and a public hearing must be held with not less than 10 days notice.

A fee of \$4 an hour will be charged for checking of applicant's plans and specifications.

The Air Pollution Control office hearing board of three members has power to approve or deny a permit, or approve an application subject to specific conditions.

State Bar Joins Fight To Gain Tidelands Title

The State Bar of California called upon Congressmen and Senators today to support legislation to return "lands and natural resources of enormous value" to the ownership and domain of California and other states.

The resolution asked Congress to pass legislation which would nullify the effect of the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the tidelands oil case which held that land within the three-mile belt along the coastline is not the property of the State of California.

The resolution urged upon the Congress the necessity of taking appropriate action (1) "to vest in California and the other states full power to control the development and exploitation of all natural resources beneath all navigable waters within their respective boundaries in accordance with state law, and (2) to release to and confirm in California and every other state the sovereign right of such states to the ownership of all land and natural resources beneath all navigable waters within the boundaries of such states."

Lucille Ball Forsakes Screen For Stage Play

It may be said of Elinor Rice's comedy hit "Dream Girl" which Jules J. Leventhal and George W. Brandt are bringing to the Biltmore theater for an appearance of three weeks only, starting Monday, Jan. 5, that this play can better be appreciated when seen and heard than the best description will serve. Surely, this is true of Miss Lucille Ball, its beautiful technician star who has temporarily forsaken her roles in the movies for the spoken stage. That goes for her supporting players, Scott McKay, Hayden Rorke and Lela Bliss and the many others in the large cast as well.

"Dream Girl" may be described as a blend of reality and fantasy. Leaning toward the comedy side, it shifts fluidly from everyday life into the vivid dreams of its heroine, Georgina Allerton, a young lady who spends a great deal of her time in day-dreaming. No psychoanalyst's study, "Dream Girl" simply mirrors a habit many of us share, although it is doubtful if many of us have sufficient imagination to indulge in day-dreams as pleasantly varied as these turn out to be.

"Dream Girl" traces one day in Georgina's life. When the play opens it is 8 o'clock in the morning, and the final curtain falls at 4 o'clock the following morning. Georgina is trapped in a romantic quadrangle, the four sides being Georgina herself; her sister's husband—a rather stuffy gentleman named Jim Lucas; George Hand, a weathered gallant who has one eye on Georgina—the other on a joint trip to Mexico; and a sardonic reporter named Clark Redfield. Georgina meets each of these suitors in turn, and bounces gaily from each encounter into an appropriate day-dream. Her mind's magic carpet takes her to a balcony in Mexico; to a maternity ward; to the brightly lit stage of a theater where she is a clever Portia; even to a street corner where she exerts her charms as a red-frocked lady of the evening.

Such a play obviously offered a great challenge to its director and scenic designer. The unique sets have been designed by the distinguished artist, Jo Mielziner. Georgina's day-dreams have been smoothly blended with the rest of the play through the ingenious use of sets which suggest rather than define. Mr. Mielziner's striking creations melt into one another right before the audience's eyes.

ARIZONA PROJECT THREAT TO CALIFORNIA'S WATER

Southern California's water supply—its last water hole—the Colorado river, is in critical jeopardy from action in Congress by Arizona.

This was the statement made by Preston Hotchkis, president of the Colorado River Association, in describing Arizona's attempt to push through Congress a bill authorizing expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000,000 for the construction of the so-called Central Arizona Project. The proposed works would supply irrigation water for a section of that state.

"If this project goes through, we will face the prospect of a real water famine in Southern California," declared Hotchkis. "As of today, an ultimate deficit of from 100,000 to 300,000 acre-feet of water confronts operating and authorized projects. Therefore, it is apparent what the 1,200,000 acre-feet now sought for the Central Arizona Project would do to our available water supply."

The Colorado river, Hotchkis pointed out, is the last water hole remaining open to the people of Southern California. In an area expanding more rapidly than any other in the nation, it is the only source from which we can obtain the supplemental water supply essential to support a constantly growing population. If this source is grabbed away from us, every farmer, every manufacturer in this area will face the peril of insufficient water to meet a growing demand.

"More than 1,000,000 acres of land, situated chiefly in the Palo Verde, the Imperial and the Coachella valleys, are dependent almost solely on the Colorado river as a source of water supply for irrigation and for domestic and industrial purposes as well," continued Hotchkis. "The coastal plain areas extending from Los Angeles to Riverside and San Bernardino, and those in San Diego and vicinity are dependent upon the Colorado river as a source of supplemental water supply for domestic, industrial and municipal purposes.

"As a matter of fact, there are several important and highly developed areas in the coastal region, including San Diego and vicinity, that are facing critical water shortages today. And these shortages can be met only by Colorado river water."

Hotchkis believes that Supreme court adjudication offers the only legitimate solution to the Arizona-California water controversy. Resolutions referring the dispute to the high tribunal were introduced in both houses toward the close of the 80th session. Congressional approval for a Supreme court suit is required, inasmuch as the United States is a necessary party.

Dr. Eugene L. Cook, of Torrance Medical Center, left Friday via TWA for Cleveland, where he is attending the annual mid-winter convention of the National Medical Association Jan. 5-8.

Registration Of Births Important

Perhaps no other legal documents are subject to more mistakes and errors than are vital records, particularly birth certificates. State law makes it the duty of the person in attendance at a birth to fill out and file the birth certificate. Generally this person is, of course, the physician, but in many cases a midwife, nurse or member of the family is the only one present and therefore compelled to complete and file the record.

Special attention should be paid to the spelling of names, both of the new baby as well as the parents. While mistakes can be corrected later, the procedure causes inconvenience and delay, and the corrections become cumbersome additions to the original certificate.

Most states have laws which make it mandatory for births to be registered, but these laws have been in effect for recent years only. Up until a few years ago California laws made it impossible to file a birth certificate later than a year after birth unless filing was authorized by action of the Superior court. However, regulations are now in effect whereby a person can obtain a delayed birth certificate without court action. In many instances this requires that the certificate must be made out or attested to by someone who was present at the time of the birth or who can attest to the facts of the case.

Forms and instructions for obtaining a delayed birth certificate in California are now available at the local Health department.
