

Gauchos, Pirate Quintets Clash Tomorrow On San Pedro Boards

Narbonne's league-leading Gauchos cage varsity treks Portward tomorrow afternoon to meet San Pedro's Pirate quintet for the second time this season.

Banning, the other team currently at the top of the loop with the Gauchos, plays host the same day to Gardena's Mohican five.

Coach Wayne Sloss' Gauchos quintet is favored to win the remaining two games on its schedule, San Pedro and Gardena, having beaten both teams previously.

The Santa Catalina \$50,000 Handicap at one and one-eighth miles, emblematic of the state turf championship, will be run at Santa Anita race track on Jan. 10, where the leading homebred foals, four-year olds and up, will be seen in the feature race of the day.

Scheduled to run are such stellar performers as On Trust with Johnny Longden up; Cover Up, with Bobby Permaine up; and Artillery with Herb Lindberg up. It is also likely that See-Tee-See, winner of last year's Catalina Handicap as well as Sierra Fox, that took third place money, will be starters.

It will be the fourth fifty grand stakes contested so far during the racing season which will be climaxed by the running of the \$100,000 Santa Anita Maternity on Jan. 31, the \$100,000 guaranteed Santa Anita Handicap on Feb. 28, and the \$100,000 Santa Anita Derby on closing day, March 6.



Local Flower Grower Develops Winter Iris

Experiments started by Fred C. King, flower grower in the Redondo-Torrance-Gardena-Dominguez area for the last 20 years, to winter bloom Irises on a large scale proved successful for the first time this year.

Normally a March bloomer, the Dutch Irises now are being harvested by hundreds of dozens in open fields every day, he reported.

Associated with King in the experiment is his son, Fred C. Jr., who gave the Irises bulbs a "false winter" by placing them in an ice box before planting them in the fall.

Their winter grown Irises are carried all over the country via air freight, King said.

Through a public notice issued today Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug opened 54 family-size farms on the Gila Project near Yuma, Arizona, to homestead entry by war veterans, Regional Director E. A. Moritz, of the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 3 announced here.

The opening comprises 4,940 acres of predeveloped public land on the Yuma Mesa Division of the project in the general vicinity of the Yuma Army Air Base. Farm units range in sizes of from 40 to 160 acres, the smaller farms being more suitable for citrus and other specialty crops, Moritz stated.
