

Tartars Riding High After Win Over Beverly Hills, Leuzinger

With Captain Paul Smith hitting for 14 points the high riding Torrance Tartar Varsity basketball squad rolled over Leuzinger 42-24 Tuesday afternoon as a follow-up on their upset victory over Beverly Hills last Friday.

The Bees, playing the pre-lim, were also victorious on the home courts with a 36-31 over the Stinger Bees.

In last Friday's game Dick Turner's free throw with five seconds remaining turned apparent defeat into dramatic victory as Cliff Graybehl's sensational swishers staged the upset of the year in the Bay League edging once beaten Beverly Hills by a surprising 33-32 margin while the Bees also broke into the win column handing the Normans a 36-30 defeat. The two torrid tussles were played in the local gym Friday night.

History repeated itself as Turner, who pitched the touchdown pass in the final seconds of the Inglewood football game, came through again for the Tartars. Experience Pays-Proves Five Old Men In Copping League Honors
