Knocked over by a gust, a tree at Columbia Steel Company fell across a truck scale, officials stated. They said that no damage was incurred.


Police theorized that the burglar alarm was started when the winds vibrated a large window in the market.

**TORRANCE TO GET \$5049 ADDITIONAL ROAD FUNDS**

Torrance will receive an additional \$5,049.74 from the gasoline tax allocation to Los Angeles County covering a period of six months ending June 30.

This was announced by Supervisor William A. Smith. According to Smith, the money had been earmarked for highway and bridge construction projects in unincorporated areas, but will be transferred to the "Aid to Cities" account.

With the \$743,880 allocation representing 3/16 of a cent of gasoline tax money allotted by the state, total grants by Los Angeles County to cities during the current fiscal year will amount to \$2,231,641, Smith said.

The supervisor declared that the added funds would be used by the cities for street maintenance and highway construction.

Largest share of the grant will go to Los Angeles City, whose portion amounts to \$448,348. Second highest sum, \$50,072, will be given to Long Beach.

This figure will double Torrance share from county road funds, as only \$5,000 had been budgeted for the six months period from this source. In addition, Torrance will get approximately \$35,000 in state gas tax funds for this year, compared with \$14,000 for last year.

The increase in state funds is based on the new population count recently fixed at more than 13,000. Approximately \$2.89 per capita is given cities in state funds.

A community effort was undertaken several weeks ago to build bleachers of a portable type and install lights for night play, and it is expected that the subject will be given serious consideration by the Board of Education at an early meeting.

Installation of lights and bleachers to accommodate from 4000 to 5000 persons would cost upwards of \$15,000, it was said. Civic leaders have expressed willingness to back the venture, in order to assure night football games here next season. Their financial obligation would be guaranteed by receipts from games, through arrangements with the Board of Education and the High School student body.

Ex-wartime test pilots, the 33-year-old twins, Herman and Henry of Inglewood, went aloft in their Prattree navy glider at 9:13 a.m. and made a perfect landing in a plowed field in Palos Verdes Estates at 10:05 p.m.

While Carl Walters of Hawthorne acted as ground crewman by towing the glider down Paseo del Sol street, starting point of the flight, friends and relatives aided the landing by illuminating the field with their automobile lights.

After breaking the record by 2 hours and 43 minutes, the fliers decided to come down, they told reporters, because: "We were down to 2700 feet and getting hungry at 10 o'clock."

"Besides, if any body breaks the record, we'll go out after it again."


