er when this office is approved by the voters in the April election.

"Changes have been made in the engineering department. We now have a separate building department to take prompt care of the checking of plans, and inspection of new houses.

"A new five point plan for wages of city employees (which plainly sets out what wages an employee can expect under this plan) has been adopted.

"A new city attorney has been appointed and he now is busy on some new work the Council has in mind.

"Since the new subdivisions have so greatly increased the work of the Water Department the Council has found it advisable to employ an assistant to Mr. Stanger.

"Last week we paid back \$10,000 to the water district. This is part of the money borrowed by a previous Council, and just as quickly as possible we expect to repay the full loan.

"We now are running on a well balanced budget system and we should have a little surplus at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1948.

"With all the new subdivisions and new building there will be many things that will come before the Council to be considered.

"The new airport is a very big project and will require a lot of consideration and study.

"I will esteem it a great honor and pleasure to be able to carry on with this Council, and so 'my hat's in the ring'."


