SUPERVISOR DARBY FIRST TO FILE FOR REELECTION JUNE 1

County Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, Inglewood, of the fourth district, which includes Torrance and Lomita, was the first to file a declaration of candidacy with the Registrar of Voters M. J. Donoghue in Los Angeles, asking reelection. March 3 was the opening day to qualify for the Primary election June 1. Darby, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, called on Donoghue before 9 a.m. for the filing.

The rubbish burning plant is to be of a rectangular type manually operated with a daily capacity of 500 tons.

LETTERS to the EDITOR

March 10, 1948
Editor Torrance Herald:

I was very gratified at the public response to my letter in the Torrance Herald of last week regarding the proposed and forthcoming bond issue of the Torrance City School District. In order that the public become aware of the present problem, and in the interest of the welfare of the Torrance City School system, I found it necessary to file as a candidate.

Since my letter of last week, and after further investigation, I now find that our tax rate is approximately \$1.60 per \$100 assessed valuation higher than the City of Los Angeles, and unless attention is directed to the heavy burdens with which Torrance real estate is loaded, the future growth and development of this community, both from an industrial and residential standpoint, will be stifled.

I now find that leading institutions have completely curtailed most loans for residential building, or even for the individual homes already constructed. It is quite possible that the many subdivision and residential building projects for Torrance now proposed, will never pass the blueprint stage, and in many instances housing financing will not be forthcoming to the promoters.

It would be a disastrous situation if school buildings were erected and we were bonded for them, and the contemplated residential area never developed. I believe that the Superintendent of Schools, in his demands to the Board of Education should take a conservative approach to this problem. We all agree that a bond issue in a reasonable amount to cover present needs for schools is imperative, and I will heartily endorse such a proposition.


