Qualifying trials begin at 12 noon, with the first competitive event, the trophy dash for the two fastest qualifying cars, starting at 2 o'clock. Inverted starts, that racing innovation which forces the fastest cars to start last, and insures the maximum of thrills for spectators and drivers, will be used throughout the show.
