extension of the North Torrance route to take in his business, farming and residence properties at 4422 Redondo Beach boulevard, said that he questions the legality of official papers bearing the residence address of a person living in Torrance when it is necessary to give a "Gardena" or "Redondo Beach" address.

The rapid growth of Torrance will bring about completion of the unification of mail service to the benefit of all of Torrance in the near future, it is anticipated.

The mail service for Torrance Manor, which started Monday involves delivery starting at 9:30 a.m. each day, with post boxes for depositing of mail being served at regular and frequent intervals, it was said.

The city delivery service in all sections of the city, as well as the rural service, will be expanded to adjoining areas as fast as growth requires, it was said.

The Seaside Ranchos area originally was in the Redondo Beach rural delivery area; Torrance Manor was in the Gardena rural area, and Kettler Knolls was in the Lomita rural delivery area.

TOYS LEAVE WAA UNIT HERE FOR WIDE DISTRIBUTION

Games by the truckload left the War Assets Administration warehouse at 190th street and Normandie avenue yesterday, as the last of \$77,000 worth of surplus recreational goods was distributed to applicants—without cost.

Most of the surplus, consisting of darts, targets, dice, chessmen, checkers, boards, ping-pong equipment, and racing games went to hospitals, schools and youth recreation centers in Southern California and Arizona, but there were a few shipments to Alaska, and one to Alabama.

pushed high up on our list of priorities."

O'Sullivan said that "We hope to start our permanent armory construction program just as soon as the department of architecture can check the plans and obtain bids."

"As you know," he wrote Thomas, "We plan to construct armories where units of the National Guard have been formed, are making satisfactory progress and appear to have the support of the community in which located."

"High up on our list for some time has been the task of completing the armory at San Pedro, which still lacks an assembly hall."

"We have been disturbed, however, by a report from the group commander that it was necessary to withdraw one unit from San Pedro and that the one remaining is not making as good progress as had been hoped."

"Generally, where a unit fails to progress, it is an indication that the community is not giving complete support. We can not, in such cases, justify the expenditure of state funds if there is a possibility that the unit will have to be deactivated."

The Torrance armory of the National Guard will cost between \$400,000 and \$500,000, it was said.



