PHILHARMONIC FINAL CONCERT SET FOR APRIL 15

The forthcoming appearance of the world's supreme tap dancer and the equally famous harmonica virtuosa, Paul Draper and Larry Adler on April 15 at San Pedro High School auditorium, is the final concert on the San Pedro Philharmonic and Artists Association's 1947-1948 subscription series. The program is included in the famous team's sixth transcontinental American tour following their annual New York season.

These two young Americans, both in their early thirties, have taken what is considered a by-product of light entertainment and lifted it to the realm of art and are considered top artists in their field. Theirs is musical fare to please everyone, from Gershwin and Kreisler to Debussy and Ravel. Both artists have appeared as soloists with symphony orchestras and Adler has played with the New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia, Detroit, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, San Francisco orchestras and others.
