Conference On Industrial Nursing Slated

Industrial nurses employed in business and industry in Torrance and vicinity are invited to attend a conference on industrial nursing, which will be held at the Biltmore Hotel, Los Angeles, April 17, Mrs. Mina Kenworthy, president of District No. 50, California State Nurses Association, announced today.

The conference will be held under the auspices of the State Industrial Nurse Section of the Association for the purpose of reviewing and discussing the problems confronting industrial nurses today. Miss Amy Alice Lauer, 5211 W. 8th street, Los Angeles, is chairman of the section.

The meeting will start with a luncheon at 12:30 p.m. in the Biltmore's Renaissance Room, followed by a program. Dr. Louis J. Regan, Los Angeles attorney who is also an M.D., will speak on new material in legal codes of interest to industrial nurses.

The role of industrial nurses in the control of occupational diseases will be discussed by Dr. Rutherford Johnstone, member of the Board of Directors of the American Association of Industrial Physicians and Surgeons. Other speakers on the program include Charlotte Ferry, Industrial Nursing Consultant, California State Department of Public Health, and a representative from the State Department of Industrial Relations.

All nurses employed in industry and commerce in Southern California are invited to attend the conference which will be the first of a series of similar meetings to be held throughout California. Reservations may be made through the Association offices, 520 W. 7th street, Los Angeles, TUcker 4462.

Under California State law, all animal bites should be reported to the local health department, following which the animal is quarantined and observed for 15 days by inspectors from the department. 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
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
