Warrior Nightingale In Upset Win In Century At 10 Flat

In a meet featured by Dick Nightingale's upset win over Art Katchaturian in the century, Bakersfield J.C. downed El Camino J.C. and East Los Angeles J.C. in a triangular track fest Saturday in Bakersfield. Final scores were Bakersfield 92½, East Los Angeles 35½, El Camino 35.

El Camino's Nightingale left his holes in a rolling start and streaked to a 10 flat victory over East L.A.'s previously unbeaten Katchaturian. But Nightingale's glory was short lived, for he finished out of the money in the furlong with Katchaturian blazing to a 21.6 victory.

Bob Hannah, muscular Warrior weight man, copped a first in the shot as he hurled the iron pellet 44 7/8. Hannah added another point to his total with a third in the javelin. Ray Southstone continued his winning ways as he sailed over 11' 6" for a tie for first in the pole vault. The 5' 6" Southstone has yet to fail to make points in the pole vault. Jack Foster captured one of the Warrior's two second places when he was edged out by Jim Wigginton of Bakersfield in the 220 lows. Wigginton skimmed over the furlong barriers in a flashy 24.9. The Caminomen's other second came from Dick Contreras, and his javelin. Contreras finished just inches behind Bakersfield highly touted John Aggers. Next Saturday the Blue and Grey squad ventures to Glendale for the All-Metro conference meet. Coach Amby Schindler has entered men in every event and hopes to make a strong showing. Max Baer To Ref Negrete-Gibbs Lightweight Go


Comback of Freddie Negrete, hailed as one of the most promising young fighting machines in Southern California; an inter-stable challenge feud between Harbor A. C. and Bakersfield Arena, and the appearance of Max Baer, ex-world heavyweight fight champion; share the spotlight tonight in the weekly amateur fight show at the Wilmington Bowl.

Baer will serve as guest referee for the card, calling several of the bouts on Joe Craig's weekly all-star "club" program, including the lightweight main event which sends Negrete, now in full stride of a comeback, against Larry Gibbs, Southern California C. Y. O. lightweight champion.

The Negrete-Gibbs brawl which brings together two of the finest 135-pound fighters in the Far West, headlines the team struggle, second in a series of highly-popular challenge feuds being staged at the Harbor arena by Craig. Last week the boys blanked a barnstorming team of champions from Mexico City, 5-0, in one of the finest shows of the season, but this time they may find the going a little rougher since Steve Strehlen, trainer of the Bakersfield Arena outfit, himself a former professional wrestler, has one of the leading clubs in the far west.

Other leading bouts on the card, first preliminary of which will begin at 8:30 p.m., find Tony Contreras, another popular Wilmington lightweight, against Bobby Jackson; Dino Burns, Long Beach lightweight, vs. Marvin Garcia; George Jaquet of San Pedro vs. Joe Gastelo in a flyweight go, and Danny Busby of Lomita vs. Frank Daniels, Southern California C. Y. O. middleweight champion.

\$50,000 Golden West Pace At 'Anita' Saturday

The \$50,000 Golden West Pace, richest pacing classic of all time, will be presented Saturday, May 1, at Santa Anita Park in the Western Harness Racing Association's fourth week of 1948 Grand Circuit racing.

Featuring the famed "Cinderella" horse from Chicago, the fleet Dr. Stanton, the big pace is expected to draw a field of 15 to 20 starters and a season's record turnout of more than 20,000 fans.

In his first start of the meeting Dr. Stanton, winner of 34 of his last 42 starts, displayed a fighting heart by leading some of the nation's finest pacers from wire-to-wire in the track record time of 2:00 1/5 for the mile. Dr. Stanton previously had worked the distance in 1:59 4/5, the first "under two-minute" mile in Southern California harness racing history.

Trout Fishing Reported Good In Most Areas

From the reports of trout fishing at the various nearby lakes and streams it looks as if opening day this Saturday will see a number of Isaac Waltons come away from the shores with strings of fish—providing they take along their own rock to stand on. A roundup of conditions at the various fishing spots as of April 21 is reported by the Auto Club of Southern California as follows:

- BIG TUJUNGA CREEK:** Water very low and very little water back of dam. Prospects fair. Heavily stocked.
- LITTLE ROCK RESERVOIR:** Water about 30 feet below normal, but melting snow at higher elevations is slowly raising the water level.
- LITTLE ROCK CREEK:** Water low, but fishable. Road is open for several miles up the canyon, but not through to Angeles Crest Highway.
- BIG ROCK CREEK:** Water fairly low, but fishable. South Fork has been stocked.
- JACKSON LAKE:** Water about normal, and has been a good bet for the opening in past years.
- LYTLE CREEK:** Water very low. Probably poor.
- SAN ANTONIO CREEK:** Water very low, prospects fair to poor.
- SAN GABRIEL RIVER, EAST FORK:** Fair amount of water. Should be fair to good.
- SAN GABRIEL RIVER, NORTH FORK:** Water lower than either of other forks. Probably poor.
