

'Newborn Baby' Film To Be Shown During Health Center Class

As a supplement to a demonstration of a baby's bath, a film, "Care of the Newborn Baby" will be shown May 27 at 9:30 o'clock in the expectant mothers' class at the Torrance health center, 2300 Carson avenue, according to Mrs. Mary Ulmer, public health nurse-instructor.

In conjunction with the review of baby bathing, the new film, "Know Your Baby" also will be shown.

Although this is the ninth in the current series of classes, all prospective mothers and those who will have the care of new babies are invited to attend. Instruction given in each session is complete, and "catch-up" classes will be offered at the end of the course, Mrs. Ulmer said. It is an educational service of the Los Angeles county health department.

Through the years the profits derived from the Poppy sales have been used for the veterans' rehabilitation program and to aid their needy families. At the same time the little "crimson flower" honors the memory of fallen comrades.

Mrs. Estes urges the public to make this year's Poppy Sale a huge success, and, in doing so, show the disabled veteran that they have not been forgotten.

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
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
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
