Dick Cloward, Torrance High's Class B shotgun title holder took second place in the C.I.F. semifinals at Glendale last Saturday and thereby became the only Tartar to win for himself a crack at the Southern California championship to be decided this Saturday at Compton.

May 15 was a nice day, but it just wasn't Jack Dean's Day. Dean, also a school record holder in the pole vault, had to go 11' 9" to qualify for the Class B run-offs and although he has cleared 12' on several occasions, his best jump remained at 11' 6". Four others qualified at 11' 9".

Aramis Dandy, who, prior to the meet Saturday had a top mark of 5' 3" in the Class C high jump, managed to clear the cross bar at 5' 6" but like Dean, four others ahead of him cleared 5' 7" and won a shot at the Southern California titles at Compton.

Coach Eddie Cole was disappointed that Dean and Dandy did not qualify but was excited about the thought of placing at least one boy in the title run-offs—a feat that not every other school was able to boost.

## CYO To Hold 2nd Jr. Olympics At Rancho Cienega

The CYO's second annual Junior Olympics will be held at the Rancho Cienega Stadium, 5000 Exposition Blvd., on Sunday, June 6. Entries for the event are available at all parochial schools, CYO centers and CYO Athletic dept., 3802 Brooklyn ave.

Separate meets will be conducted for parochial school boys and girls and settlement house and center boys. Events listed in the school boys competition are 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash, high jump, broad jump and 330 yard relay.

School girls events will be limited to 50 yard dash and 120 yard relay. Settlement house boys will compete in the broad jump, 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash and 160 yard relay.

## NO LIMIT ON ENTRIES

There will be no limit on the number of entries from each school, settlement house or center. However, competitors will be limited to three events.

To qualify for the school event, a boy or girl must be in eighth grade or under. Center competition will be for all boys 18 years or under.

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# Bay League Coaches Name Theodosis As 1st String Pitcher

Harry Theodosis of Torrance High has been named one of the three first string All-Bay League pitchers.

Also singled out for honors was Bob Chambers who was named Second String short stop and Vaughan Stokoe who received Honorable Mention for his work in the outfield.

Theodosis, who has been the leading strike out pitcher in the Bay loop, shared the first string with Swartz of Jordan and Tait of Beverly Hills. Named by baseball coaches of the Bay League, Theodosis was singled out for consistent pitching and perseverance. Hard luck has stalked the Tartar chucker all season. Twice he pitched over time contests and lost them both by one run, one of them a 15-inning affair.

He completed the season with 64 strikeouts for an average of nine and one-seventh fan-outs per game. His batting average came right in the middle of the list with .216.

Bob Chambers' fielding at short stop was second only to Neal of Santa Monica. He accounted for more runs batted in than any other member of the Tartar squad and was the backbone of defense for the hapless Tartars.

Vaughan Stokoe, affectionately called the "Boston Bean" by his team mates, has possibly the most accurate arm in the Bay League. Best remembered throw was his long heave in a game against Inglewood when he fielded a grounder in right center field and hurled a mighty throw that nipped the tying run at the plate. Standing but 5'4" he was the hardest to pitch to of all the Bay League sluggers.

Stokoe leads his team in hits with an average of .353.
