Caldwell Seeks Nomination As Representative

Formally announcing his candidacy for nomination as representative from the 17th district to the U. S. House of Representatives, James G. Caldwell, well known director of the Torrance Area Veterans Service Center, made the following statement: "I believe in a democratic form of government and am opposed to any form of Communism. I am against any form of government that would deprive man of his individual rights or in any way deny him free enterprise. I am against any form of regimentation or oppression. I believe in God and a free people, and think that the churches in the United States are our first bulwark of defense against any form of Communism."

"I think we should keep out of foreign entanglements and keep our guns and ammunition in the hands of American fighting men ONLY. Don't arm any other nation for war. "Peace is paramount and you can't buy it with dollars; nor may we obtain it with an olive branch in one hand and a gun in another. Peace is the most important and necessary requirement of the world today. "If nominated and elected I will serve all the people, placing the disabled Veteran FIRST." Caldwell resides at 22120 Monica ave., Torrance, and has taken a leading part in fostering the welfare of World War II veterans for several years.

Sheriff's Air Patrol To Spot Smog Violators

Aerial patrols over the Torrance-Lomita area and the rest of Los Angeles County to hunt down "sneak" violators of smog control laws were begun this week in joint operation by Dr. Louis C. McCabe's air pollution inspectors and Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz's aero detail.

Heretofore, no inspectors have been on duty over the weekends and Dr. McCabe said he considered it more than "a coincidence" that refuse depots and dumps caught fire during these periods from what was afterwards claimed to be "spontaneous combustion."

Inspectors will be assigned to this aerial patrol each weekend beginning this week. Dr. McCabe announced. Combining the smog patrol with their own aerial traffic duties will be Capt. S. P. Griggers, Sgt. Arthur McDaniel and Sgt. Jack Hackley of the Sheriff's aero detail.

Because Saturdays and Sundays find most industries closed down, these two days usually offer easier observation of any smoke violation, the smog officer said.

Dr. McCabe made the first flight and inspectors Henry Burns, William Parmelee, Ivan Beckert and Thomas Jump have been assigned to the first weekend patrols.

New Location For Sewage Outfall Favored Locally

Notification of Redondo Beach's approval of switching sewage outlets from Hyperion to White's Point has been received by A. M. Rawn, chief engineer of the South Bay Sanitation Commission.

City councilmen of Redondo Beach unanimously approved the measure and informed the chief engineer of the advantages in the change. Pollution of Santa Monica Bay would be decreased by elimination of the South Bay sewage disposal costs for sewage disposal would decrease, and doubt as to the capacity of Hyperion plant in the future would be eliminated, councilmen informed Rawn.

The change-over will save the area a quarter of a million dollars, disposal of sewage at the White's Point plant will cost \$1 per million gallons while Hyperion cost for the same amount is \$10.

Torrance sewage is at present disposed of through the White's Point outlet.
